Always Being Made New-Lutheran Camping Corporation

The Campaign for the ELCA is our opportunity to invest in the future of this church, deepen relationships and expand ministry opportunities that serve our neighbors and communities in the United States and around the world. **St. Peter's will be running this campaign from October 1-22. During the last two years we have focused on certain ministries aided by the Always Being Made New Campaign. You may remember the 2015 focus on Malaria with mosquito infestation or the 2016 focus on the water initiative as your rostered leaders attempted to hold 40 pound water jugs at the beginning of each worship service. These past two years we have dedicated over \$10,000 for the Always Being Made New campaign. It's from your gifts that families a globe away are safer from the threats of malaria and water contamination.

This year our focus shifts to the local, future leaders that are impacted by the Lutheran Camping Corporation. Again it's our hope to raise \$5,000 for this focus of the Always Being Made New Campaign.

Why Lutheran Camping Corporation?

Speaking with several Lutheran camping directors around the country, it is clear that our Lutheran camps are a seedbed for growing leaders today. In fact, just this summer alone, we had a number of young adults from St. Peter's involved in Lutheran camping and outdoor ministries. One of our 'camp kids' is currently undergoing studies at United Lutheran Seminary. Research in leadership studies tells us that over 50% of today's pastors had some kind of pivotal faith experience at a Lutheran camp. (Pastor Sarah is a product of leadership training at a Lutheran camp, and can say that many of her skills as a pastor were learned on the fields and forests of that Lutheran camp. If you have any questions feel free to ask her!)

The ELCA also knows that many children do not have the funds to go to camp, and may never experience the deep faith opportunities and mountain top moments one can have at our Lutheran camps. The ELCA also knows that several of our valued Lutheran camps have been hit hard with lack of funding, and may not be able to support tomorrow's leaders today.

This is where we can make an impact. You and I can help ensure that tomorrow's church leaders are blessed today, that impoverished kids get to go run freely and see the face of God in the midst of our camp's forests and fields, and that families like your own have a place that they may deepen their faith.

Over the summer, we received a listing of names and email addresses from our Spiritual Gifts coordinator, Mary Ann Frontz, for those that scored higher in both Faith and Intercession when they completed the Spiritual Gifts Survey in the Spring. We recently sent an email to over 30 of those folks. We explained that the prayer chain began as Vicar Jerry Kulp's intern project and was originally cochaired by Pat Ross and the late Joan Ralston, until the summer of 2015, when it



was turned over to us. We distribute requests as they are received and pray for those requests up to two weeks, have a list of On-Going Folks we pray for and also distribute the names of the families of the church to the members, so EVERY family in the church is prayed for at least two times per year! We have an All Member meeting in the Fall and we do a book study together in the Spring. This is one of the few church committees where all of your "work" is done on YOUR schedule and YOUR timeframe! All requests are handled with EXTREME CONFIDENTIALITY and sensitivity.



"Now there are varieties of gifts, but the same Spirit"

SKILLED CRAFTSMANSHIP

The gift of Skilled Craftsmanship enables the believer to use a trade or craft for the good of the body of Christ.

Scripture References (NRSV):

2 Kings 12:11-12 – "They would give the money that was weight out into the hands of the workers who had the oversight of the house of the Lord; then they paid it out to the carpenters and the builders who worked on the house of the Lord, to the masons and the stonecutters, as well as to buy timber and quarried stone for making repairs on the house of the Lord, as well as for any outlay for repairs of the house."

Ezekiel 27:4 – "Your borders are in the heart of the seas; your builders made perfect your beauty."

Isaiah 41:6-7 – "Each one helps the other, saying to one another, "Take courage!" The artisan encourages the goldsmith, and the one who smooths with the hammer encourages the one who strikes the anvil, saying of the soldering, "It is good;" and they fasten it with nails so that it cannot be moved..."

Acts 18:1-3 - "After this Paul left Athens and went to Corinth. There he found a Jew named Aquila, a native of Pontus, who had recently come from Italy with his wife Priscilla, because Claudius had ordered all Jews to leave Rome. Paul went to see them and, because he was of the same trade, he stayed with them, and they worked together – by trade they were tentmakers."

Letter From the Vicar



Erős vár a mi Istenünk! [A Mighty Fortress is our God!]

Now that we are in the month of October, much of what started in September at St. Peter's is well under way to include Sunday School, choir practice, etc. This October, however, is special because of the 500th anniversary of the Reformation. As Lutherans, we have a lot to be proud of regarding our religious heritage, given that Martin Luther is widely acknowledged as having initiated the Reformation when he posted his *Ninety-Five Theses* on the door of Wittenberg Cathedral on October 31st, 1517 that challenged the Roman Catholic Church and the Papacy. Thank you for your efforts, Dr. Luther! However, Luther was not the first to pose a challenge.

Significant attempts were made by other reformers before Luther. But it was Luther who really got the ball rolling. Adults will have the opportunity to learn more about the various reformers of the Reformation during three *Crosspoints* classes being offered during the first three Sundays of October.

October also is the continuation of the hurricane season. North America suffered the brunt of several storms in September to include Irma—the strongest hurricane ever recorded in the Atlantic. Despite all the chaos and devastation that resulted, what was refreshing was to see neighbor helping neighbor regardless of race, religion, political differences, etc. Matthew 22:39 says "To love your neighbor as yourself." The love and support exhibited between people from all walks of life was evident in the aftermath of the storms. This was such a contrast to the ugliness and violence that occurred in Charlottesville, Virginia, this past August.

In addition to the anniversary of the Reformation, the end of October is a time to begin reflecting on those whom we lost over the past year in preparation for All Saints Sunday on November 5th. Interestingly, it was Hurricane Irma that prompted me to think about All Saints Day because Irma reminded me of one of my favorite humorists having the same name but spelled with an "E": Erma Bombeck (1927-1996). When Bombeck learned

she was dying, she poignantly wrote a very short piece about what she would have done had she had the chance to live her life over again. Here are some excerpts: "I would have talked less and listened more. I would have invited friends over to dinner even if the carpet was stained, or the sofa faded. I would have cried and laughed less while watching television and more while watching life. When my kids kissed me impetuously, I would never have said, 'Later. Now go get washed up for dinner.' There would have been more 'I love you's.' More 'I'm sorry's.' But mostly, given another shot at life, I would seize every minute... look at it and really see it... live it... and never give it back." And Bombeck's advice to all of us: "Stop sweating the small stuff. Don't Worry about who doesn't like you, who has more, or who's doing what. Instead, let's cherish the relationships we have with those who do love us." I would add to Bombeck's advice that we also cherish the relationships we have with those we love. This is something to keep in mind as we continue down life's path.



Last, I have begun teaching in Sunday School under the guidance of Sister Dottie and am looking forward to teaching at the various adult forum classes (*Crosspoints* and *Faith and Values*) starting this month. Hope to see you in class!

Always Reforming

There's a Latin phrase, *semper reformanda*, that sometimes gets thrown around this time of year. Every October we spend a Sunday celebrating the Reformation and how God continually guides the mission of the church. As we commemorate the 500th anniversary of Martin Luther nailing his 95 theses to the door of the castle church in Wittenberg, this year has been no different.

However, the Reformation is not a single event. No, the church has always been re-forming itself. From the early days after Jesus' death and resurrection to now, the institution of the church has changed many times. This makes sense. As each generation grows into its own, the church must adapt, must re-form itself. While the church may reform and change, God's mission for the world, present in the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus, breathed into being by the Holy Spirit, remains constant. God loves us and will never let us go.

So, it is easy to look back and see how the church has changed over the years. We have met in secret in people's homes or remote caves/catacombs and we have built huge ornate buildings in which to meet. Memberships grow and diminish. Theology varies from individual piety to tent revival movements to heightened church dogma. Through it all, the music composed for use in the church reflects these different realities.

And now, here we are in 2017, continuing the mission of God's church. We are inheritors of thousands of years of reformation which deserve celebration and thought. We also find ourselves asking, "What changes will the next thousand or two thousand years bring for the church?" We come back to the Latin phrase *semper reformanda*, always reforming. While the church may change to meet the needs of the world around it, God's mission always stays the same. The church may not always resemble the church of our childhood, but the love of God is the single constant driving force for the church's re-formation throughout all of history.
