United Lutheran Seminary News

During the summer of 2017, United Lutheran Seminary officially opened its doors. This seminary is a new creation formed out of the seminaries of Gettysburg and Philadelphia. The Rev. Dr. Theresa Latini is the first president of United Lutheran Seminary.

The Inauguration of the Rev. Dr. Theresa F. Latini, the first president of United Lutheran Seminary, takes place Thursday, November 2, 2017 at Holy Trinity Lutheran Church in Lancaster, PA. The events around the inauguration include a reception, a worship service and a panel discussion. Some of the presenters include:

- Dr. Eric D. Barreto (Ph.D., Emory University) is the Weyerhaeuser Associate Professor of New Testament at Princeton Theological Seminary.
- Dr. Lois Malcolm (Ph.D., University of Chicago) is a professor of systematic theology at Luther Seminary.
- The Rev. Bernard "Chris" Dorsey is President of Higher Education & Leadership Ministries of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ).
- The Rev. Lisa Larges (M.Div., San Francisco Theological Seminary) is the Associate Pastor for Congregational Care at Lake Nokomis Presbyterian Church in Minneapolis MN, and the Outreach Coordinator for Minnesota State Services for the Blind.
- The Rev. Elizabeth Eaton is Presiding Bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America

We will keep President Latini in our prayers as she, the faculty, staff and students continue the good work of the seminary.

November is National Diabetes Month

Each November, communities across the country observe National Diabetes Month, to bring attention to diabetes and its impact on millions of Americans.

Diabetes is one of the leading causes of disability and death in the United States. It can cause blindness, nerve damage, kidney disease, and other health problems if it's not controlled. One in 10 Americans have diabetes — that's more than 30 million people. And another 84 million adults in the United States are at high risk of developing type 2 diabetes.

The National Eye Health Education Program (NEHEP) is encouraging people to spread the word about how persons with diabetes can protect their vision. People with diabetes need to get a comprehensive dilated eye exam at least once a year and keep their health on track to prevent vision loss.

Living with diabetes can be challenging to manage every day. You are the most important member of your diabetes care team, but you don't have to manage your diabetes alone. Seek support from health care professionals, your family, friends and community to manage your diabetes.

The good news? People who are at risk for type 2 diabetes can lower their risk by more than half if they make healthy changes. These changes include:

- eating healthy (stay away from those cookies and refined sugars)
- getting more physical activity (take the stairs instead of the elevator, park farther away)
- losing weight (make portion control your first step)

Remembering Thanksgiving


As I think back on the days of old When my family would gather round A big long wooden table With lots of festive sounds.

Global Missions

KIDNAPPED to go to SCHOOL! Maasai Girls' Chance for Education

Education for girls has not been a high priority in many cultures worldwide. This past September Janet and Steve Roberts (members of St. Peters) and I had an extraordinary opportunity to visit a community of Maasai people whose values reflect this view. We were participants in an ELCA mission trip to Tanzania and Rwanda. The purpose of this trip was to see first hand what some of our ELCA missionaries are doing to bring hope and Good News to people living in this part of Africa.

The Maasai people, living mostly in southern Kenya and northern Tanzania, have traditionally been herders of cattle and goats. During our one-day visit within this community, we met an ELCA missionary couple, Dr. Steve and Bethany Friberg. They have lived within this Maasai community for the last 27 years. Dr. Friberg has established five medical clinics in this part of Tanzania to bring better health care to these communities. His wife, Bethany, has been working with the women to establish a beadworking micro business and cooperative. We were fascinated to watch these women work on their beading as they sat in the shade of an acacia tree.

So what is this about kidnapping and education? To clarify, the Tanzanian government mandates six years of free education to all children. However, after these six years, education is not free and many families cannot afford to send their children to secondary schools.

The Maasai culture's values determine who goes to secondary school. Sons showing great promise in herding skills stay home to work with their fathers. The "dull" sons not showing great promise are sent on to secondary school. On the other hand, girls, at age 12 or 13, are considered to be of marriageable age. Marriages are arranged and the girls' chances for further education are lost.

An ELCA missionary, David Simonson, recognized this great loss of opportunity for girls. In 1995 he established the Maasae Girls Lutheran Secondary School in a town far away from the Maasai so that girls exhibiting high intelligence and eagerness to learn could continue their studies. The problem has been that many fathers do not want their daughters to continue school. Thus, the "kidnapping". Teachers target girls with potential. On the last day of sixth grade, instead of going back home to certain marriage, the girls are secretly transported to this residential school where they remain until they finish secondary education and can earn their own income. It costs \$1000/year to sponsor one girl's education at this school. There are 350 girls on campus during the school year. In 2015 those who had graduated 20 years ago came for a reunion. Among them were a pilot, physicians, and teachers. What a gift they received through the support of the ELCA!

We can continue to support this educational opportunity for girls by giving to the ELCA Global Church Sponsorship. Stay tuned for next month. Learn about World Hunger and what it means to support it!

Scripture References (NRSV):

Matthew 17:20b – "For truly I tell you, if you have faith the size of a mustard seed, you will say to this mountain, 'Move from here to there,' and it will move; and nothing will be impossible for you."

Romans 4:13, 19-21 – "For the promise that he would inherit the world did not come to Abraham or his descendants through the law but through the righteousness of faith." "He [Abraham] did not weaken in faith when he considered his own body, which was already as good as dead (for he was about a hundred years old), or when he considered the barrenness of Sarah's womb. No distrust made him waver concerning the promise of God, but he grew strong in his faith as he gave glory to God, being fully convinced that God was able to do what he had promised."

James 1:5-6 - "If any of you is lacking in wisdom, ask God, who gives to all generously and ungrudgingly, and it will be given you. But ask in faith, never doubting."

People that have this gift,

- believe the promises of God and inspire others to do the same;
- act in complete confidence of God's ability to overcome obstacles;
- have an attitude, in various crises that arise, not only that God can do something, but that God will do it;
- advance the cause of Christ because they go forward when others will not;

Pastor's Letter

Dear Friends:

For those who are interested in such things, you can read the Thanksgiving Day Proclamation offered in our lands by the President of the United States. It typically shows up on the internet a day or two before Thanksgiving Day, so we do not yet have this year's text. But typically words such as these are voiced by our nation's highest office holder:

For generations, our Nation's progress has been carried forward by those who act on the obligations we have to one another. Each year on Thanksgiving, the selflessness and decency of the American people surface in food banks and shelters across our country, in time spent caring for the sick and the stranger, and in efforts to

empathize with those with whom we disagree and to recognize that every individual is worthy of compassion and care. As we gather in the company of our friends, families, and communities -- just as the Pilgrims and the Wampanoag did centuries ago -- let us strive to lift up others, promote tolerance and inclusiveness, and give thanks for the joy and love that surround all of us.

It is a reminder that we are always bound to each other ... maybe first as the human family, and certainly also as the family of God. We may not always agree in regards to what that familial relationship looks like, but it is difficult to ignore the inter-connectedness we share with those across the globe.

Oft times as Thanksgiving rolls around, we think about the image of family in modest ways ... those who are related to us by blood, and maybe only those who are one or two steps away from us on our family tree. That is certainly what we do in our family. As is true for many, we find a way to be together at least one or two days over the Thanksgiving holiday.

I would simply offer a gentle reminder of the far broader yoking that binds us to others this month and always. At our annual meeting on the second Sunday of this month we examine life in its broadest scope at St. Peter's, and we have the opportunity to celebrate the family that is our congregation along with the family that is the world-wide Christian family. On the first Sunday of the month we'll remember those saints who have left this world for the next one, and we will celebrate the "communion of saints" and our connectedness to those with whom we share a common heritage of family, friendship or church. On the last Sunday of the month, we will celebrate Christ the King Sunday, and consider the great company of all God's children of every time and place. Lots of family to go around this month. Enjoy yours. And don't forget to enjoy your St. Peter's family, also, as we ...

Pastor Sarah's Message

Dear friends in Christ,

Have you been feeling stressed out? I know that I have been tackling the question of stress. Name the area, and I'm probably stressed out about it. I think I've always been one to carry stress (just ask my chiropractor how stress manifests in my neck). I believe we live in stressful times, and it is incredibly easy to be swept up in the negativity of it all.

Now I'm not recommending that you all buy plane tickets to Bermuda and abandon your lives, your vocations, and your loved ones nor do I recommend that you ignore the world's pain. Remember, that we are cross-people. We remember that Jesus died for our sin and the sin of the world, and we know that God is with us in our deepest, heaviest, and most stressful days.

But, we are also resurrection-people. God creates new life on a daily basis. Martin Luther calls this the daily dying to sin and rising to God grace and hope offered to us through the love and mercy of Jesus Christ.

I was looking at the Lord's Prayer and there's a simple petition "Give us this day our daily bread." Good ol' Marty Luther had something brilliant to say about this, as well. He writes in his Small Catechism

What does this mean?

God surely gives daily bread without our asking, even to all the wicked, but we pray in this petition that he would lead us to realize this and to receive our daily bread with thanksgiving.

What, then, is meant by daily bread?

Daily bread includes everything that we need for our bodily welfare, such as food and drink, clothing and shoes, house and home, land and cattle, money and goods, a godly spouse, godly children, godly workers, godly and faithful leaders, good government, good weather, peace and order, health, a good name, good friends, faithful neighbors, and the like.

In the worship setting, the daily bread can be received in communion where Christ's presence is with us, in us, and around us. And as Martin Luther makes mention, this daily bread is experienced in so many facets of our lives...and sometimes we just miss how much God is blessing us.

How do you receive your "daily bread" with thanksgiving? Friends, I want to challenge myself and you as well, with the task of giving thanks for God's work and "daily bread." I want to challenge myself to lift up in prayer the places where I need God's daily bread to manifest (especially those days where the anxiety and stress seem insurmountable). I want to challenge myself and you to lift up the places where you see God delivering and blessing us with "daily bread."

Perhaps the 30 days of thankfulness chart may be a place to start or perhaps you have your own way of seeing and living into God's "daily bread."

I cannot speak to the stresses that you may be facing, but I know that I hope to engage in a month of thankfulness as a way to counter my own personal stressors, anxieties, and demons. I pray that this month you may be filled with the goodness of God's "daily bread."

Letter From the Vicar

Erős vár a mi Istenünk! [A Mighty Fortress is our God!]

As Thanksgiving Day approaches, let us not forget to be thankful for all that God has given to us. However, I would like to suggest that we all go to the extremes and be thankful every day for all of God's creation! Psalm 100 resonates with thanksgiving and praise to our Great

Creator! And while we are in such a thankful mood, don't forget to be thankful for and honor the service and sacrifice of both present and past

members of the U.S. Armed Forces on Veterans Day—November 11th. Keep in mind that here in the United States, we have many freedoms, to include religious freedom, because of the service of countless men and women throughout the history of our great country. Those who have or are currently serving in our military understand that freedom has a cost, to include laying down their lives in service to their fellow Americans. It is written in John 15:13: *Greater love has no one than this, that he lay down his life for his friends*.



All Saints Sunday is November 5th during which St. Peter's will lift up those saints who have passed away during the last 12 months. All Saints Sunday is a good time not only to reflect on relatives and friends whom we have lost, but also to be thankful to God for them. When my sister died in September 2016, a friend sent me Anglican theologian Henry Scott Holland's Death is Nothing at All to help console my grief: Death is nothing at all. It does not count. I have only slipped away into the next room. Nothing has happened. Everything remains exactly as it was. I am I, and you are you, and the old life that we lived so fondly together is untouched, unchanged. Whatever we were to each other, that we are still. Call me by the old familiar name. Speak of me in the easy way which you always used. Put no difference into your tone. Wear no forced air of solemnity or sorrow. Laugh as we always laughed at the little jokes that we enjoyed together. Play, smile, think of me, pray for me. Let my name be ever the household word that it always was. Let it be spoken without an effort, without the ghost of a shadow upon it. Life means all that it ever meant. It is the same as it ever was. There is absolute and unbroken continuity. What is this death but a negligible accident? Why should I be out of mind because I am out of sight? I am but waiting for you, for an interval, somewhere very near, just round the corner. All is well. Nothing is hurt; nothing is lost. One brief moment and all will be as it was before. How we shall laugh at the trouble of parting when we meet again! I hope this passage brings some comfort to anyone who is grieving. Most importantly, however, is that we have God's resurrection promise to bring us peace, strength, and hope! In John 11:25-26a, Jesus said "I am the resurrection and the life. Those who believe in me, even though they die, will live, and everyone who lives and believes in me will never die."

From the Director of Music

Endings Bring Beginnings

November is an interesting time in the church year. On the first Sunday of the month we remember those saints who have gone before us. We also remember that they are always celebrating the resurrection of Jesus as we do when we share communion. In some traditions, the pastor says or sings the following words as a preface to communion, "And so with the choirs of angels, the church on earth and the host in heaven." That host in heaven includes our loved ones. They join with us in giving thanks for all that God has done for us and for this world.

The readings in the middle of November often turn our thoughts to the time when the things of this world will pass away. This year we are reminded we do not know the hour of the Lord's triumph as we read the stories of the wise and foolish bridesmaids found in Matthew 25:1-13 (November 12) and the story of the slaves entrusted with talents found in Matthew 25:14-30 (November 19). These stories, and others like them, can seem like abrupt and sudden paradigm shifts, but they signal that which is to come.

At the end of November, the vision becomes reality in Matthew 25:31-46. We read stories of how the Son of Man will come and sit on his throne in glory. The sheep are separated from the goats and we proclaim that God's rule has always been, is now, and will be forever.

And yet, we also know that Advent is coming: a time when we wait with hopeful expectation of the child. While we proclaim God as ruler of all creation in all past ages, we also begin to ask this same God to come down anew and "stir us up." We proclaim a God who has always been in charge, but who also has yet to come to us. God's promises to us spring afresh, even in what will be the darkest time of the year. God renews us and comes to us exactly when the need is greatest.

ART in WOOD by JEFFREY H. PRETZ - "Wood carving has become a wonderful hobby and creative outlet for me. When I was in Cub Scouts I remember "carving" a cardboard woodpecker with an emery board. I did not do any serious carving until about 1980 when some of my colleagues and I were at Camp Kirchenwald for Confirmation Camp and we started carving walking sticks. For the next 20 years I was carving a walking stick each summer at Camp Kirchenwald. Since 2001, I moved from carving walking sticks to snowmen to caricatures to spoons. I joined the Lancaster County Wood Carvers Club which has a festival every March. I have copied the carvings of others, but most of my carvings are uniquely mine. Mostly I use knives and gouges to create my carvings. I really enjoy holding my work in my hand as I carve. I have carved hundreds of pieces ranging in size from tiny snowmen carvings to 42" Hank the Garden Gnome. Most of my carvings are done simply for my enjoyment and as gifts. For Christmas, about 5 years ago, I carved 85 napkin holders as gifts for family and friends. Each holder was made from a 2" cube with the four flat faces bearing Pennsylvania Dutch Folk Art images. These images were inspired from a blanket chest painted by my grandfather as a wedding gift for my parents. This project was featured in Woodcarving Illustrated a few years ago. About a year and a half ago I started carving spoons and bowls. These are all done with knives and gouges and are finished with Mineral Oil and Beeswax so they are food safe. Take a look at my carvings in the Art Hallway beginning this November. Thanks for the opportunity to show off my creativity and growing skill by the Grace of God."

EMILY PRESTON, daughter of Bob and Pam Preston, is a sophomore at Kutztown University, working toward her BFA degree in Communication Design. Emily enjoys the process of creating and will be displaying various examples of her work including illustration, digital design, and other forms in the Art Hallway.
