Advent Season at New Day Praise Service, 10:45am in the Family Life Center



Advent begins on December 3rd and the New Day Praise service will be doing something a little different from the Traditional services. This year New Day will not be offering a Christmas Eve service, but much of the elements of Christmas Eve will be experienced during the Advent season. Along with its praise music and relaxed atmosphere the Gospel readings for each Sunday in Advent will describe the "Long Road to Christmas" where we will be on the road with exiles, angels and shepherds as they seek out the promise of Christ. Music will feature some beloved

traditional Christmas music as well as contemporary praise music.

Mid-Week Advent Worship

Mid-week Advent services begin in December, as we celebrate the coming of our Savior in the manger in Bethlehem and at the end of all the ages on the first three Wednesdays in December. A display of creches from the collection of Jill Pretz will be in the curio cabinet and table located in the narthex, beginning the Sunday after Thanksgiving and continuing through January. Jill has been collecting creches, or nativity



scenes, since 1970, although most of her early sets were destroyed in a house fire in 2003. Since then, she has gathered together over sixty sets. Many were purchased from 10,000 Villages, some are antiques bought on Craig's List and some were gifts from friends who helped rebuild her collection after the fire. Several are hand carved by Jeff Pretz. The displays are from various cultures and countries but they all tell the beautiful story of the birth of the Baby Jesus, Christ the Lord.

A Christmas Gift to You


I am oftentimes reminded Of so very long ago When that tiny little Christ child Was born in a manger meek and low.

National Handwashing Awareness Week 12/4 – 12/10/17

As flu season begins at this time of the year, and of course germs are all around us, do you know that the ONE thing that everyone can easily do to prevent illness is: Wash Your Hands?!

Imagine how great it would be if you or your family were never sick again from a respiratory infection, flu or even a cold? The T Zone (the central part of a person's face, including the forehead, nose, and chin) is the area of Do Not Touch. It is the only portal of entry into the human

body for ALL respiratory/flu like infections!

Practicing the 4 principles of hand awareness will ensure you stay well:Wash your hands when they are dirty, before eating, after using the restroomSing the Happy Birthday song twice, making sure to lather well and rinse/dry well tooDo Not cough into your hands (use the corner of your arm at the elbow)Do Not sneeze into your hands (again, that corner of your arm at the elbow!)Above all, do not put your fingers in your eyes, nose or mouth!

Pastor's Letter



As the moon reflects the sun until the night's decrease, may we your healing light release, living peace, living peace, unto your holy dawn. ~~As Dark Awaits the Dawn, ELW 261

In general, by this time of the year, we are starting to get a little jittery about getting Christmas decorations out of the closet and on display in our homes. We are planning for parties or family visits, while shopping for presents online and in the stores. We are thinking about meals and cookie baking and maybe even crafts that we will create with the little ones in our

lives. There is an anxiety that accompanies the season that for most is a bit energizing and exciting.

This year, there is a different kind of anxiety that is anything but energizing and exciting. For we are living in a wrinkle of time that seems surreal given the level of violence in our world and the frequency with which it touches down in communities all over the globe. As I write, we are about a week out from the tragic shooting at the Sutherland Springs Baptist Church. My prayer is that by the time you read this, our headlines will have been mundane and boring and empty of further tragic shootings and attacks. But I will admit that I wonder to myself whether this is a realistic hope that I harbor in my heart. Our world seems to have changed dramatically in terms of the level of violence that surrounds us these days.

I see lots of fingers being pointed at proposed causes: the proliferation of guns and automatic weapons; the "take no prisoners" character of drug wars; the breakdown of the nuclear family; the gridlock of non-cooperation among leaders at the highest levels of our governments; the inability to regulate borders and screen out terrorists. On any given day, I could sign on with any one of these as the straw that has broken the camel's back of civility in our world. But most days I simply look around me and see a level of violence in almost every corner of our lands that seems to continue to ramp up and spread like a viral garden weed. We love our violence in our sports, our movies and our electronic games. And I wonder if that desensitizes us to ever greater tolerance of violence everywhere else. I cannot be sure, of course. I'm no sociologist. But it has a feeling of truth to it, at least from my limited perspective.

If you dare to entertain the possibility that this is the world that we live in, then Advent is a season that should be as meaningful to you and me as any of our liturgical seasons throughout the year. Because Advent focuses upon the coming of the Prince of Peace. *"Come, O Prince of Peace, Come!"* That will be the opening to all of my prayers this Advent season. I cannot begin to hazard a guess as to what Jesus's coming might mean for our world. I am no Pollyanna who expects magical solutions to problems that have developed over years, decades and even centuries. But I am a believer in the Lord of Life who is also the Prince of Peace – our savior who has come into our world to redeem and renew us in the messes we create, and save us from ourselves, if need be. Pray with me that this Jesus arrives in our lives early and often this Advent season.

Dear friends in Christ,

The other day I was sitting down to dinner with my family, we said grace, and as the first forkful of food was lifted I turned to my husband and listed off three things that had to get done immediately in preparation for the Advent/Christmas season. We chewed on our food and on our ideas and plans in preparation of the season. As I finished my last forkful of food my daughter pointed to her green trick-or-treat pumpkin and asked to have some candy for dessert. That's when I realized that Halloween was "yesterday" and here we were planning for Christmas Eve and feeling like we were extremely behind schedule trying to make up for lost time. I scoff at big box stores for piling up the next holiday item before we can live in the current one.

and here I find myself doing the same thing. If you are like me, there is a rush in this time of year.

As I type this letter, I see an Advent lectionary guide that we'll be using at New Day Praise service titled "The Long Road to Christmas" and I laugh a little. The long road? The road is too short! There's not enough time!

And yet the road is too long, marked with a lot of pain. These past few months have been quite painful for our nation and our world. Sometimes this time of year is an "escape" from the pain. I sometimes convince myself that if I just listen to one more Bing Crosby Christmas song or watch the Charlie Brown Christmas special for the third time in a row that the longing will subside. It is a long road to Christmas. It is a long road looking back to the Christ child born to Mary. And the road before us can feel quite long as we wait for Christ's return and for God's kingdom to be fully realized.



Perhaps this is why we pray the prayer, "Stir up your power, O Lord, and come." Perhaps this is why we begin this season by looking at the end of days because we know the final page of the story of salvation. Perhaps this is why we look to John the Baptist who calls us to repent from the things that are not of God. Perhaps this is why we need to witness once again to heroes of the faith like Mary and Joseph who said "yes" even as they faced real threats of terror, violence, oppression, and isolation.

Perhaps this is why we long for this season. We long to gather together in worship to witness the love born in a manger and to see this love incarnational in bread and wine and tangible in each other's care.

Yes, it is a long road, and on this road we walk together with saints past and saints present. We walk in boldness pointing to the king born to lead us on the road to life.

Letter From the Vicar



Erős vár a mi Istenünk! [A Mighty Fortress is our God!]

Advent begins on December 3rd this year and is the season of the church year that leads up to Christmas. Unfortunately, the true meaning of Christmas is either not known to everyone or has somehow been lost in all the rustle and bustle of the secular world during the Christmas season. Not every person on this earth is a Christian and then there are those with no faith tradition whatsoever. Sadly, I also would not be surprised if there are so-called Christians who have

wandered away from the church and no longer know what the true meaning of Christmas is. Despite all of this, I believe I am safe to presume that there are Christians (and even non-Christians) who indeed do know what Christmas is really about. As for the Christians in this group, I also would presume some of them are aware that Advent is the time to prepare to celebrate the birth of Jesus, who was sent to this earth as God's gift of love to all of humanity, so that Jesus could dwell among us and minister to us, and ultimately die on the cross for our sins. However, what is sometimes forgotten during Advent is that in addition to preparation, Advent is also a time of anticipation—we anticipate the second coming of Jesus who will give us eternal life. We know through Scripture that Jesus died on the cross for our sins as well as conquered death through his resurrection. In John 3:16-17 it is written: *For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life. Indeed, God did not send the Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him.*

One thing all Christians can do to remind themselves about what the true meaning of Christmas is would be to focus their attention on the act of gift-giving, but specifically on the gift God gave to us that very first Christmas Day—Jesus



Christ, his only son! God's gift made known in Christ is truly the "reason for the season" which some folks also would argue is why "Christ" is in the word "Christmas." To reiterate the wonderful gift of Jesus Christ from God to us, I would recommend watching *A Charlie Brown Christmas*. I had the opportunity to play Linus in a church Christmas play when I was in the 7th grade so, as Linus, I was the one who revealed the true meaning of Christmas to a frustrated Charlie Brown who was agitated by seeing Christmas all around him, but noting that it appeared no one really knew the true meaning of Christmas as well as seeing that Christmas was shoved aside in favor of commercialism and business. Linus's monologue (Luke 2:8-14): *And there were in the same country shepherds, abiding*

in the field, keeping watch over their flock by night. And, lo, the angel of the Lord came upon them, and the glory of the Lord shone round about them! And they were sore afraid. And the angel said unto them, "Fear not! For, behold, I bring you tidings of great joy, which shall be to all my people. For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, which is Christ, the Lord. And this shall be a sign unto you: Ye shall find the babe wrapped in swaddling clothes, lying in a manger." And suddenly, there was with the angel a multitude of the Heavenly Host praising God, and saying, "Glory to God in the Highest, and on Earth peace, and good will toward men. Yes, this is what Christmas is all about!

St. Peter's is pleased to present two of our talented members... Jeffrey H. Pretz and Emily Preston. The Art Hallway is just past the Chapel and Choir Room, turn left.

ART in WOOD by JEFFREY H. PRETZ - "Wood carving has become a wonderful hobby and creative outlet for me. When I was in Cub Scouts I remember "carving" a cardboard woodpecker with an emery board. I did not do any serious carving until about 1980 when some of my colleagues and I were at Camp Kirchenwald for Confirmation Camp and we started carving walking sticks. For the next 20 years I was carving a walking stick each summer at Camp Kirchenwald. Since 2001, I moved from carving walking sticks to snowmen to caricatures to spoons. I joined the Lancaster County Wood Carvers Club which has a festival every March. I have copied the carvings of others, but most of my carvings are uniquely mine. Mostly I use knives and gouges to create my carvings. I really enjoy holding my work in my hand as I carve. I have carved hundreds of pieces ranging in size from tiny snowmen carvings to 42" Hank the Garden Gnome. Most of my carvings are done simply for my enjoyment and as gifts. For Christmas, about 5 years ago, I carved 85 napkin holders as gifts for family and friends. Each holder was made from a 2" cube with the four flat faces bearing Pennsylvania Dutch Folk Art images. These images were inspired from a blanket chest painted by my grandfather as a wedding gift for my parents. This project was featured in Woodcarving Illustrated a few years ago. About a year and a half ago I started carving spoons and bowls. These are all done with knives and gouges and are finished with Mineral Oil and Beeswax so they are food safe. Take a look at my carvings in the Art Hallway beginning this December . *Thanks for the opportunity to show off my creativity and growing skill by the Grace of God.*"

EMILY PRESTON, daughter of Bob and Pam Preston, is a sophomore at Kutztown University, working toward her BFA degree in Communication Design. Emily enjoys the process of creating and will be displaying various examples of her work including illustration, digital design, and other forms in the Art Hallway.



FROM THE ARCHIVES

Our church published a cookbook in 1950 called **Neffsville's Favorite Recipes**. In addition to recipes from many of St. Peter's fine cooks ranging from Green Tomato Relish (Mrs. Clara Lausch) to Flannel Cakes (Mrs. Amos Kreider), there were also several off-topic pages. One in particular was devoted to BEAUTY HINTS and how to avoid wrinkles. It reads: *Start by getting as much rest and sleep as possible -- avoid worrying -- try to keep your facial muscles under control -- avoid excessive frowning, squinting and other habits which may tend to form wrinkles. A well lighted home will help to avoid squinting. Massage wrinkles with a rotary and upward motion followed by a good astringent.
