Fall Wednesday Morning Bible Study

Mark your calendar for **Wednesday, September 12th** for our first Wednesday Morning Bible Study Class of the Fall. Again this year we will have a two-semester system in which we study two different topics.

We will start the year exploring the topic "Comparison of World Religions," and examine: the five major world religions in terms of followers, which includes Judaism and a couple of others including those who consider themselves as "unaffiliated". We'll spend the remainder of the year studying a comparison of all four Gospels, seeing which stories are common to all four Gospels, and which stories have a singular unique status in just a single Gospel.



Why not consider joining this vibrant group of 40-50 fellow believers this Fall as we study familiar material in ways that always open up faith discussions, historical reflections and theological questions. We have a strong class that has the involvement of both church members and community members, which creates an atmosphere that is rife with conversation and insights offered from both leaders and participants. In addition to visiting guest speakers and presentations by our lay team of facilitators (Brendan Armitage, Jen Sassamann and Neil Snyder), our Crosspoints Adult Sunday School Class will be holding a series of classes throughout the year entitled "Here We Stand" (HWS), presented by our rostered staff leaders Sister Dottie, Pastors Ross, Geib and Teichmann and Vicar Nancy Brody. Some of the classes will be facilitated jointly and others will be led by one of these leaders. The goal is to understand a multitude of topics through a Lutheran lens.

The first session on September 16th will be led by Pastor Geib and will examine fundamental Lutheran theology as found in the Bible and in basic Confessions adopted by the Lutheran Church. We hope to promote a better understanding of Lutheran theology and how we can address current topics such as church and state, salvation, interfaith issues, human sexuality, end of life issues, and more, as rational, thinking Lutherans! GLOBAL MISSIONS SUNDAY – SEPTEMBER 9TH



Brianna Melhorn, a very special speaker, will join us on September 9th at 9:15 a.m. for the Adult Sunday School Class to share her experiences working in a border immersion program in El Paso, TX. Brianna, a Manheim Township alumni, as well as a former Spanish Immersion student, is a junior at Temple University double majoring in Global Studies and Spanish with a minor in Arabic. In 2017, Brianna studied abroad in Costa Rica through a Spanish Immersion program at La UNA, the state university. During her sophomore year she was accepted into a Border Immersion Program which led her to an assignment in El Paso, Texas. Prior to the experience, she took classes to understand the realities of immigration in southern border cities. Last March during her Border Immersion experience, she visited health clinics,

met with Border Patrol agents, federal judges, immigration attorneys, and local non-profit organizations such as La Iglesia Cristo Rey.

Throughout her time in El Paso, Brianna had the opportunity to see the U.S./Mexico border herself and gain first-hand experience in the complexities of the border system. After returning to Philadelphia, Brianna and fellow classmates held a "Learning without Borders" gala to educate those in the Philadelphia area on the realities of the immigration system. All profits from the event went to support a summer school program, attended mainly by immigrant children, in the El Paso community. Currently, Brianna is working as a law clerk at the firm of Marcia Binder Ibrahim, which specializes in immigration law. Throughout this past summer, she has been to the York County prison for court hearings and to translate for several of the Law Firm's detained clients. Ultimately, Brianna aspires to go to law school to pursue her goal of becoming an immigration attorney.

We hope you will join us in the Conference Room on September 9th to hear Brianna share her experiences in El Paso.

Pastor's Letter

Dear Friends:

"Gentlemen, welcome to the NFL, you are now being paid to play, football is your profession. But I can tell you it is not your life. You can't let it be. Part of my job is to help you find your life's work."

Chuck Noll quoted in his biography, Chuck Noll: His Life's Work

Chuck Noll's biography was on my summer reading list, and while I was cautious about reading a football book, I was so pleasantly surprised by this book that was about football ... and so much more. Chuck Noll's character and his compulsion to be a positive presence in the lives of those he coached (and pretty much everyone else he met), drove the story of his life. And the quote above shows up over and over again in his dealing with the hundreds of young men he coached. Football, while seen as an end in itself by owners and fans and the players themselves, was never the goal for Noll. "Life" was the goal, and he strove to use football as a means to the end of helping young men find "their life's work."

This may sound a little cheesy, so I'll apologize ahead of time. But might it also be said that church going is not an end in itself, but a tool and experience that helps you find your life's work. Christianity is not the end in itself, but is a life choice that is intended to shape you into the disciple and apostle that God needs you to be for the world. Church life is a means to the end of being God's person in this world. Do you ever consider your life through this lens? Each of us spends time at church in various ways, and generally I think most would say it is purposeful and satisfying. But the church is never the final goal of our



work, service and faith. We are called to spread this great news we have heard and embraced to others who have not heard it ... or who maybe have heard it but forgotten it or misunderstood it. We are called to live in ways that will point people to the positive impact this great news can have upon their lives. We are called to make sacrifices ... ones that are monetary in nature ... ones that require the gift of our time ... ones that use the talents with which God has blessed us.

So ... the invitation to re-engage your church life in the coming weeks is about much more than your preachers trying to get you back in the pews. It is about "your life's work." Join us regularly in worship ... and education classes ... and in fellowship with each other ... as we strive together to hear this powerful calling of God to be witnesses to Jesus and the impact he and his teachings can have upon each of his children.

Pastor Sarah's Message

Dear friends in Christ,

I was spending some time reminiscing about the summer. It went quickly!

Yet, as I reminisced and revisited some pictures taken during the summer, I was pleased by how much life was fit into those few weeks. For the Teichmann family, the memorable moments were spent helping my mother-in-law move into her new house in Lancaster, taking a 4,000 mile trip (pulling a camper) to see family in North Dakota, and traveling north to Maine to celebrate my dad's upcoming birthday.

What made these summer memories special were the locations (Mount Rushmore, Mackinac Island, the Portland Head Lighthouse, to name a few!) oh and the great food (buffalo burgers, steamed crabs, fried clams). The tasty food and the special places would not have the same meaning if I could not share them with family, or retell the beloved family stories of old, or remember some of our family who have since passed and we can in many ways still feel their love when we gather.

In many ways we experience a similar thing in worship. Rev. Dr. Gerry Christianson, a beloved seminary professor that both Pastor Craig and I had at Gettysburg, spoke of worship as a ritualized party. We gather together and get to see each other and catch up. We can offer each other our best hopes (the peace of Christ) and share with each other some of the best family stories (our Holy Scripture). And in this party God is the host and invites us to a table that's big enough for everyone. There's room for young and old alike, and around the table we can still feel the presence of family who have long since been called to their eternal home. And we receive a meal that fills us with life and hope. And then the host gathers us up, blesses us, and sends us out once again.

As your pastor, there are treasured moments I keep in my heart when I get to be part of the party. I have snapshots in my memory of the food we call the "bread of heaven" and giving you Christ's body and blood along with the promise of forgiveness, grace, and life eternal. I also have snapshots of you as you are part of this party. And it is the company I keep with you, and the great host who gathers us together, that make these memories holy and special.



From the Director of Music

Time to Party...er...Worship!

Can we think of going to worship as going to a party? When you think about it, our Sunday morning gatherings look like ritualized parties; parties where our actions have been more formalized than if we were going to a party at a friend's house. In some ways the four parts of our communion services, Gathering, Word, Meal, and Sending, parallel what happens at our non-ritualized, non-deliberately-religious get togethers.



First, to have a party we must gather together. We are a people who occupy homes in a wide variety of places. We also occupy ourselves with vastly different work and family life situations. Sometimes when we have a party we tend to invite folks who are like us. Yet in worship, all divisions cease when we gather together. Worship on Sunday morning just wouldn't be the same if we all did it separately in our own homes. God calls us together to worship as God's people.

Next, it's story time! When I go to a party, I ask my friends what is new in their lives and I hope to hear some good stories that I might be able to relate to. I also look forward to being asked about my life and to tell my friends about the newest batch of beer I brewed or about how raising a family can be so difficult sometimes. In the same way, after God has gathered us together, we hear the stories of God's family throughout the ages revealed to us in the readings for that day. God's word comes to us through these stories that we may see God's great love for us and all of God's people gathered together.


What would a party be without some great food? Labor Day celebrations need burgers and dogs on the grill, cocktail parties need cocktails, and what would a birthday party be without birthday cake? Each party has its own theme for food and worship is no different. The theme for our worship/party is Jesus! (Remember, 90% of the time at church the correct answer is Jesus.) The extraordinary body and blood of Jesus are presented in, with, and under the bread and wine made from ordinary wheat and grapes. This meal, offered freely to all, is one of the greatest symbols in worship. Food and drink are distributed freely to all regardless of any division we may attempt to impose upon it. It is not earned. It is pure gift.

Of course, all good things must come to an end and most hosts make it clear their guests are to leave at some point. With the work of the party accomplished, good times had, stories told, and food shared, it's time to go back to our regular lives. Worship is different. Oh sure, worship comes to an end and we go to Sunday School or on to breakfast. But worship is different because we are a changed people. We who were gathered, who listened to God's stories of love, who received God's grace unbounded, are changed and we are SENT out into the world. In this way, we can never return to our 'regular lives' because God sends us out saying, "Go in peace. Serve the LORD."

Worship has reoriented us toward lives of service, striving for peace and justice among all God's people. Worship has embodied the mission of Jesus Christ in the world, welcoming all, feeding all, embracing all. Worship is the party to which all are invited, and from which all are sent having received boundless grace.
