Mission Appeal Update

This is an exciting time for St. Peter's! Church leadership has spent the past several months discerning the direction in which we think the Lord is calling us, that we might fulfill, even more deeply and faithfully, our vision through a mission campaign.

In order to consider launching a campaign, it is important for leadership to hear what is on the minds and in the hearts of our members. We have hired Richie and Rachel Musser, from Kirby-Smith Associates, to assist in this effort. Kirby-Smith Associates is a Christian fundraising firm founded in 1938 that is experienced in working with and for churches. Over the next few months, Richie and Rachel will be assisting with the feasibility study, which is the first phase of campaign planning. In short, a feasibility study will assess the capacity, capability, and readiness of the congregation to launch a successful campaign.

Please take a moment to introduce yourself when the Mussers join us for worship and look for more information to follow on how to personally speak with them during the feasibility study. We thank our Congregation Council for authorizing and approving the process which brought the Mussers to us, and our Campaign Planning Committee for interviewing consultant candidates and recommending Kirby -Smith Associates to the Council for approval. LNP ARCHIVES – Lancaster Intelligencer Journal July 7, 1917 - Lutherans Split on Amalgamation

Atlantic City, July 6 – Constitutional questions which threatened to defeat plans to celebrate the birth of a United Lutheran Church in America, in connection with the observance of the quadricentennial of the Reformation, in Philadelphia in October, loomed up at a meeting of the committee on Constitutional Revision of the General Council of the Lutheran Church in North America, at the Hotel Dennis, Atlantic City.

Many of the foremost theologians of the Lutheran faith in the country attended the preliminary session of the committee. The Rev. Dr. Theodore Schmuck of Lebanon, president of the General Council, presided over the session, with the Rev. O. J. Johnson, of Gustavus Adolphus College, of St. Peters, Minn., one of the leaders of the Augustana Synod, the Swedish branch of the church, which is national in scope, as secretary.

Proposals advanced since the committee was created two years ago, specifically to formulate a new constitution under which the General Council would become solely a deliberate and advisory body, contemplate the merging of the three great branches of Lutheranism... the General Synod, the General Council, a conservative Lutheran church body, and the United Synod of the South, into a United Lutheran Church. The General Council and the General Synod split years ago, over doctrinal issues, and the United Synod of the South has been a body apart ever since the Civil War.

LNP ARCHIVES – News Journal - November 9, 1918

Pittsburgh, Pa. November 8 – Three great bodies of the Lutheran Church – the General Synod, the General Council, and the United Synod of the South – will be merged into one body to be called the United Lutheran Church in America, it was announced here tonight. The amalgamation will take place at a convention in New York, starting next Tuesday, the ratification to be held in the Hotel Astor, Friday evening, November 15.

LNP ARCHIVES – Lancaster New Era – November 16, 1918

New York City - Merger of Lutheran Synods Ratified – The United Lutheran Church of America was incorporated at New York on Friday. More than 1,000 delegates from this country and Canada ratified the merger. The Rev. Dr. Frederick H. Knubel of New York was elected president on the third ballot. He graduated from Gettysburg College in 1893 and the Gettysburg Seminary three years later. He then began establishing the Lutheran Church of the Atonement in New York City of which he is pastor. Resolutions were adopted pledging "the fullest support of the United Lutheran Church in America to the government of the United States to meet the problems of vice, which threaten the physical and spiritual welfare of the boys and girls and men and women of these United States." The delegates were also urged to aid in combating Bolshevik propaganda in this country. The property of the consolidated church is estimated at over 53 million dollars and with an annual expenditure between 6 and 7 million dollars.

Addiction Ministry



January – National Thyroid Awareness Month

The thyroid gland is a small, butterfly-shaped gland located in the neck just below the Adam's apple. Although relatively small, the thyroid gland plays a huge role in our body, influencing the function of many of the body's most essential organs, including the heart, brain, liver, kidneys and skin. The thyroid hormone helps the body use energy, stay warm

and keep the brain, heart, muscles, and other organs working as they should. It is vitally important to ensure that your thyroid gland is healthy and functioning properly.

The American Thyroid Association (ATA) is the world's leading professional association of medical specialists dedicated to education and research to improve thyroid disease prevention, diagnosis and treatment. More than 12 percent of the U.S. population will develop a thyroid condition during their lifetime. An estimated 20 million Americans have some form of thyroid disease. *Up to 60 percent of those with thyroid disease are unaware of their condition.* Women are five to eight times more likely than men to have thyroid problems. The causes of thyroid problems are largely unknown, and undiagnosed thyroid disease may put patients at risk for certain serious conditions, such as cardio-vascular diseases, osteoporosis and infertility. Most thyroid diseases are life-long conditions that can be managed with medical attention.

- Hypothyroidism is a condition where the thyroid gland does not produce enough thyroid hormone. Symptoms include extreme fatigue, depression, forgetfulness, and some weight gain.
- Hyperthyroidism, another form of thyroid disease, is a condition causing the gland to produce too much thyroid hormone. Symptoms include irritability, nervousness, muscle weakness, unexplained weight loss, sleep disturbances, vision problems and eye irritation.
- Graves' disease is a type of hyperthyroidism; it is an autoimmune disorder that is genetic and estimated to affect just *one percent* of the population.

Ask your Doctor or Healthcare Provider if you need testing, and if diagnosed, take your medications.

Pastor's Letter

Dear friends:

Another New Year ... an opportunity to turn the page on the twelve months gone by ... an invitation to look ahead farther than your next meal ... a challenge to learn from the mistakes made and the wisdom embraced this past 365 days ... the privilege of dreaming about possibilities that await you as the next four seasons unfold. Although January 1st is just another day in the roughly 28,300 days you are projected to live, it does possess a bit of potency for some reason. That liminal experience of crossing over can be powerful on this day. So ... we often take some time to reflect. Some look back, while others look ahead. Allow me a moment or two, to look ahead.

I will admit that much of my thinking is directed to our upcoming feasibility study. Church leadership has spent the past several months discerning the direction in which we think the Lord is calling us, that we might fulfill, even more deeply and faithfully, our vision through a mission campaign. This will be an important examination of the support within the congregation for some identified needs we are aware of, and for some projects that will no doubt arise from the congregational participation in this study. I hope that each of you will find a way to be connected to this study with your hopes and dreams for St. Peter's. Please see page 3 of the Herald for more information.

I also find myself thinking about our intern program. January is the month in which, for the past twenty years, I have spent hours reflecting on and then writing a mid-year evaluation for our intern du jour. Some of you have asked me what life is like without an intern. I will share with you that I have more time for pastoral ministry without an intern. The significant commitment of exposing interns to life in a congregation like ours ... the amount of writing of reflections and evaluations throughout the year ... the supervisory time dedicating to debriefing ministry with an intern ... and the commitment to regular cluster meetings with other interns in our area ... are just a few things that can gobble up time. I have always enjoyed that gift of time in helping to prepare a seminarian for service in the church. But I will admit, that I have been able to be a little more present in a number of our ministries without an intern. We are not at a place that we need to decide whether we will restart the intern program. But at some point, that discussion will be had. I would love to hear from you about your feelings about life with and without an intern. What choice would you make, if asked to sponsor another intern?

And I think about all the experiences with which God will surprise me. Moments of joy that make me smile, coupled with moments of loss that will bring me grief. Times I will be gratified by the growth of a ministry or program, and times when I will be ready to tear my hair out in frustration over an opportunity lost. Times when children will act wisely and as adults act foolishly. Times when I will sit in my office fuming over the latest frustration that makes me question why I ever went into ministry instead of actuarial science, followed by times that I will wonder why God has been so good to me by nudging me into ministry and leading me to St. Peter's, especially. But most importantly, I wonder about those experiences I cannot even imagine, but which God will bring into my life ... experiences both good and bad, joyful and sorrowful, productive and destructive. And in doing so, I give thanks for a creative God who surprises me regularly, and offers me graces anew each day. May the same be true for you. Till we get a chance to talk in person, I'll ...

Pastor Sarah's Message



Greetings friends in Christ,

Do you like to watch movies? One of my favorite movies growing up was Mel Brooks' *Spaceballs* and one of my favorite scenes is when the bad guys in the movie are watching *Spaceballs*: *The Movie* trying to catch up to the good guys and they get to the scene of "now."

At one point the bad guy asks, "When will then be now?" and his WHEN WILL THEN BENOW? lieutenant helpfully responds, "Soon!"

I feel like I've been living this scene over and over for the last couple of days. As I write this article, it is currently December 10, and I am

writing it now, but you're (hopefully) reading it soon...maybe sometime around the first week of January.



The whole writing something now for you to read it soon is a good thing to do when it takes time to prepare, produce, edit, and print a newsletter. But a lot can happen between now and then, and it is all happening soon!

Rewinding to this past Fall, during our Fall Town Hall and the 2019 Annual Meeting you were presented with the proposed Mission Campaign which will raise funds for missional needs including Christian educational resources, safe church initiatives, worship environment enhancements, church property renovations and improvements, and global mission initiatives that will lead this congregation to the future to which God is calling us. Before we endeavor in raising funds, we need to engage in a feasibility study.

One of those "*now*" things that is currently happening is the Mission Campaign Planning Team is currently interviewing a couple of consulting companies who will lead us through the feasibility study for our proposed mission campaign. The members of the Mission Campaign Planning Team include council members Edwin Cortes, Jill Emmert, and Bob Hollinger as well as stewardship committee members Jennifer Schlener-Thomas and Adrian Young. The team is rounded out by Bob Bowman, Pastor Craig Ross and myself.

By the time you read this article, we will have recommended a consulting firm to the council and the council will have voted on the firm. In fact, we hope that you meet leaders of this consulting firm soon.

As I write this article in December, some of the timeline pieces are still wet cement, but I hope that by the time you read this in January, you will be provided with a clear timeline for this feasibility study as well as ample opportunities for your voice to be heard during the feasibility study.

Right now, I deeply feel Saint Paul's words, "For *now* we see in a mirror, dimly, but *then* we will see face to face. *Now* I know only in part; *then* I will know fully, even as I have been fully known." (1 Corinthians 13:12).

Now I write this to you, but then (in January), I look forward to living into what God may have in store. I look forward to what we may discover together through this feasibility study, and how God is calling us together into community and faith.

From the Director of Music

First and foremost, thank you to all the musicians, worship support, and worship leaders at St. Peter's who go above and beyond during the Advent/Christmas season. Without the consistent work of many of the church's membership, our celebration of the Christ child coming

among us would be impossible. May their service be a beacon and a guide as we seek to continue to be changed by God's presence among us.

After the hubbub of December we can all use a little downtime; however, when it comes down to it, January is a busy month when it comes to celebrations in our lectionary, particularly the first half. At a time when we would prefer to be resting on our laurels, we can miss much if we aren't paying attention. Jesus is named on the 1st. We continue to celebrate the birth of Jesus until the coming of the wise men on the 6th. Jesus is baptized on the 12th and begins his public ministry.

Although we know there is a gap between Jesus' birth and Jesus' ministry (obviously Jesus wasn't born a grown man!) the implication in our lectionary cycle is that God gets to work in us as soon as God arrives. It reminds me of the old adage 'there's no time like the present.' Personally, as one who tends to worry far more about the future than the present, this may be one of the greatest gifts this time of year bestows upon me. This time of year invites me to ask 'who', 'what', and 'how' questions, rather than 'when' questions:

Whom can I serve today? What is God calling me to right now? How can I serve my neighbor?

What does this mean musically? I am the Director of Music, after all. I think it means attempting to follow the call to be in the moment. Rather than focusing on my personal response, my likes and dislikes, I want to focus on the words of a song and how they might shape my faith and action.

How is my faith and the faith of the community shaped by the words of this song? What does God call me and the community to do through the words of this song? Who is invited into the grace of God through the words of this song?

Asking such questions may disrupt our usual existence. Of course, we might expect the coming of Christ into our lives to ruffle some feathers. Through it all we can take comfort in the knowledge that God is in control of it all. Allowing God to worry about the future makes space for us to serve our neighbors now.
