ANNUAL MEETING

Annual Congregational Meeting Sunday, November 14 at 10:30 a.m.

This year's Annual Meeting will be held on Sunday, November 14th at 10:30 a.m. in the Family Life Center. We will worship in a unified fashion at 9:00 a.m. in the sanctuary with both New Day and traditional congregations gathering together. Following worship, we will adjourn to the Family Life Center for the Annual Meeting. As of the Herald printing deadline, church leadership is exploring options to have sound available outside on the Delp Road side of the building, so that those unable to be present indoors, may still be able to listen to the proceedings of the meeting. A children and youth activity will be offered for all non-confirmed youth in

the Youth Lounge during the meeting. Confirmed youth can vote in the proceeding, so we hope they will be with us in the meeting.

At this year's meeting we will conduct typical business such as approving the 2022 budget, electing congregational officers and council members, and receiving a few reports from some congregational committees and leaders. We will hear an update on the mission campaign and we will also have a first vote on the constitutional changes we have been working on for the past couple of years. A brief update on the call process will also be offered. You should be here for three reasons: (1) We need a quorum to conduct business; (2) You should know how your congregation is being managed by your staff and fellow members; and (3) It is your responsibility to take ownership for these items which are entrusted into the hands of the congregation gathered at this meeting. We hope to see you on the 14th.

Call Committee Update

When a pastoral vacancy occurs in a congregation of the Evangelical Lutheran Church of America, two primary wheels start turning. One is a congregational wheel – which includes grief over the departure of our pastor, anxiety about how to cover leadership for ministries without that pastor, and some excitement centered on thinking of a new future God has in store for us that comes to fruition through the call process for a new pastor. The second wheel that begins to turn is the synodical wheel – which includes partnership with the congregation in navigating the period of vacancy, and a primary role in guiding the call process for a new pastor. I offer this one bit of advice as we look at the balance between these two entities and their roles: (1) There is one congregation we are focused on here at St. Peter's – that congregation whose physical footprint lies on the corner of Delp Road and Lititz Pike, and whose ministries actively touch the lives of about 1500 members; (2) There are 235 congregations in the Lower Susquehanna Synod – our synod – and there are roughly 98,000 persons touched by the ministries of those 235 congregations. You can do the math. St. Peter's will not be the only congregation for whom our synod is conducting call processes, nor the only congregation for which some of our synodical leaders have responsibility as our shepherds of the call process.

A congregation may not start a call process until the departing pastor has completed her or his call, so last week I put in my first call to our synod office asking for guidance in starting our call process. I did have an informal call with our bishop, early in my medical leave, to discuss a couple of specific items, but they were mostly about giving Bishop Dunlop a sense of what our landscape is as a congregation. He (of course) reminded me that we could not start any formal call process until Pastor Sarah completed her call with us.

So the assistant to the bishop will get us started shortly on the early stages of the call process. I have been part of seven call processes here at St. Peter's including my own and Sister Dottie's. And each one has reflected mostly subtle changes in the process. So I will not share any details of the process until I can speak with some authority using the resources the synod provides. What you can do at this stage of the process is pray for your leadership along with the leadership of our synod. You should also think about whether you or someone you know might be a candidate for a call committee or a congregational profile committee. Both of those items are central parts of the call process. I'll share a few more details about each in the next issue of the Herald after I see the latest documents from the synod.

Lancaster Advocacy Action Ministry

Several members of St. Peters have joined with members of other churches in the Lancaster area to form a new organization, Lancaster Advocacy Action Ministry (LAAM). Our ministry is focused on working for justice in our local community. This is one way that we can live out our call to "learn to do good; seek justice, rescue the oppressed, defend the orphan, plead for the widow." Isaiah 1:17

The ELCA social statement "Our Calling in Education" states that, "Because all are created in God's image, all have equal worth and dignity and should be treated accordingly. ... All students are entitled to good schools, and when they receive a high-quality education, society benefits." As Lutheran Christians, we are called to reduce economic and racial disparities in quality of public education.

Pennsylvania schools are sorely underfunded. Did you know that Pennsylvania ranks 47th in the country for state contributions to public school funding? Without enough state support, we rely heavily on local property taxes to fund our schools, resulting in dramatic disparities in the quality of education our children receive. According to the Education Law Center - PA, poor districts receive \$4,800 less per student than rich districts, and even suburban districts like Manheim Township are shortchanged by over \$2,000 per student per year. We believe that every child deserves the chance to develop their God-given gifts through a quality education. LAAM has joined forces with other people of faith throughout the state to call for justice in education funding.

Health & Wellness

November is COPD awareness month

Chronic obstructive pulmonary disease, commonly referred to as COPD, is a group of progressive lung diseases. The most common of these are emphysema and chronic bronchitis.

Emphysema slowly destroys air sacs in your lungs, which interferes with outward air flow.

Chronic Bronchitis causes inflammation and narrowing of the bronchial tubes, which allows mucus to build up.

Symptoms: Initially, they can be mild; you might even mistake them for a cold. As the disease progresses, you may develop occasional shortness of breath, especially after exercise. You may have a mild but recurrent cough, needing you to clear your throat often (especially first thing in the morning). These symptoms then become more constant, causing you to have difficulty breathing, even just walking up stairs with wheezing and tightness in the chest. In later stages, you may experience fatigue, swelling of the feet/ankles/legs and weight loss. Clearly, if you smoke or are regularly exposed to secondhand smoke or chemicals, things can be much worse.

<u>Tests</u>: To evaluate your lung problem your Dr. may order: *Spirometry* (deep breathing into a tube— evaluates your lungs abilities). *Chest x-ray* (images of your lungs, blood vessels and your heart — evaluates the structures of each). *Arterial blood gas* (a lab test using blood from your artery - evaluates the oxygen, carbon dioxide and other levels). These tests help determine if you have COPD, asthma, or maybe heart failure.

<u>Treatment</u>: Treatment will help ease symptoms, prevent complications and generally slow disease progression. You may be referred to a lung specialist or a respiratory therapist. You may require oxygen, (sporadic or continuous), if your blood oxygen level is too low.

<u>Other facts</u>: It's estimated about 30 million people in the U.S. have COPD. As many as half are unaware that they have it. Untreated, COPD can lead to a faster progression of disease, heart problems, and worsening respiratory infections. The average age of someone with COPD is 40, with some history of smoking. The risk is greater if you have asthma and you smoke or if you're exposed to chemicals/fumes in your workplace, or long term exposure to air pollution.

<u>Lifestyle changes</u>: Lifestyle changes may help alleviate your symptoms and/or provide relief: If you smoke: quit. Avoid secondhand smoke/chemicals/poor air quality. Good nutrition will help your lungs/body better manage. Check with your doctor about safe exercises you can do.

NOVEMBER is also Lung Cancer Awareness Month; one of the leading causes of death in the US.

Let's focus on every breath we take, and keeping our lungs healthy.

Administratively Speaking ...

It has been a very busy September and October. The Property Committee inspected the Vicarage house and found areas that needed repair. The shingled roof was old and was curling up – not a good sign. Thankfully there have been no reports of roof leaks. A new roof was installed on the house and garage. We discovered the radon fan was not operating. When the switch was turned on, you could hear something inside. Property Chair, Bud Benton, took it apart and found a dead bird that found the wrong place to make a nest. The radon fan was replaced and is back in operation.

We discovered water stained ceiling tiles from the narthex down the entire length of the music hallway. Going onto the flat roof, the Property chair discovered worn and missing caulking where the flat roof joins the sanctuary structure. This was repaired and stained ceiling tiles were replaced.

During the first week of Daytime Preschool, in just 5 days four in-wall air conditioning units leaked on preschool floors. Sextons Tom and then Chuck and I tore them apart one-by-one and found the condensation drains were clogged solid. We cleaned the drains and put them back in action. Bud Benton and George Groff went room to room with an air compressor and shop vac to clean all the units. Needless to say, this is now on my seasonal Property to-do list.

Meanwhile, Rich Larrick and Mark Aho were busy putting together shelving and a new banquet table cart and repairing broken equipment. Rich fixed the church sign electrical problem. Bud and Mark trimmed the hedges and removed Kudzu plants along the Lititz Pike frontage. Next, Rich and Mark will tackle the job of mounting a donated large screen monitor in Augsburg Alley for Sunday School use.

Property has sent out RFPs (request for proposals) to several large paving companies for the LONG overdue repaving of the church parking lot. You will need to keep dodging potholes until work is done next spring. Your gifts to the Mission Campaign appeal have made this much needed repaving possible.



Saturday, October 16, the United Lutheran Seminary staff, professors, Board members, and alumni from all over PA and beyond descended upon St. Peter's for its installation service for its new President, Dr. Guy Erwin. (Fun fact that I read in the program. Dr. Erwin is a member of the Osage native American tribe and was, in fact, born on a reservation in OK. He is the first native American to hold the presidency of ULS.) Special thanks to sextons Joey and Davey Striggle, Nelson Gehman, Jonathan Bowman, Chuck Fisher; and volunteers Bud Benton and Rich Larrick for working on the setup and teardown for this seminary event. The seminary called us to express its thanks for everything.

The Lancaster Intelligencer Journal – November 10, 1954 Rev. Clay Rice dies at 67; Was Minister 40 Years

The Rev. Clay E. Rice, 2442 Lititz Pike, Neffsville, pastor of the Neffsville-East Petersburg Lutheran parish for more than 35 years, died yesterday at 8:30 am at St. Joseph's Hospital after an illness of six months. He was 67 years old. His body will lie in state at St. Peter's Lutheran Church, Neffsville, tomorrow evening from 6:30 until 9 and Friday morning from 8:30 until 9:30 when services will be held. Officiating at the funeral service will be Dr. Dwight F. Putnam, Lutheran Synod president, the Rev. Warren C. Heinly, president of the Lancaster Conference, and Dr. Carl Rasmussen, president of Gettysburg Seminary. Brief services and burial will be held in Middletown, Md. Prior to his fatal illness the Rev. Mr. Rice had never missed a service or speaking engagement due to ill health during the entire 40 years of his ministry. A graduate of Myersville Md. High School in 1907, he received his AB degree from Gettysburg College in 1911 and was ordained by the former East Pennsylvania Synod in Zion Lutheran Church, Harrisburg in May 1914.

Pastor's Letter

Hi Folks:

As I write, I'm about two weeks into my return from medical leave. I would be remiss if I did not offer my thanks to our church leadership for approving my six and a half weeks of medical leave. It allowed me to give my complete focus to my four hour a day therapy regime. When I saw my surgeon on September 24, he cleared me to drive and to return to work on Monday the 27^{th} for half days with full time work on October 3^{rd} . I am thankful for your thoughts, prayers, cards and

snacks that you sent during my recovery. It was encouraging to have your support, and reminded me of the community of faith from which I was absent.

I must also offer my deep and abiding thanks to my family for helping me navigate that same period of time, two weeks of which required me to be on a walker and another two which required me to walk with a cane. Nancy's steady presence in our home organizing daily meals, events and commitments while also shouldering the burden of managing all our household duties until I was mobile, gave me the greatest gift of all -- the chance to focus completely on my PT and healing. Jess, Matt & Sam ... Justin & Meg ...and Lori and Tom, were also a tremendous help in breaking up the monotony of my days with visits and companionship, coaching me in my early days of PT to give Nan occasional breaks, along with running errands for us and getting me to off-site physical therapy sessions. I know I am blessed by my family, but sometimes it reveals itself in a more pronounced way like these past weeks have done for me.

I am pain free in my knees ... I continue to put 10K steps on my Fitbit each day as I work to re-train my leg and foot muscles to turn my feet "out" instead of "in" (though I will admit to having a bit of grief in losing my lifelong identity of being pigeon toed). My endurance continues to improve and I am working hard to get my head "back in the game" so to speak, as St. Peter's world is quite different today, then it was when I locked my office door on August 11th for six weeks. I have been blessed in many ways by what I am calling this "miracle" in my life.

We stand on the threshold of continuing change in our community. The most obvious example of that is the ongoing navigation of safe protocol and practices while we still have young persons who are as yet, unable to receive a COVID vaccine. Our landscape seems to change weekly depending on new case numbers, along with the outbreaks in subsegments of our community. As a staff we remain grateful for your patience as we strive to be good stewards of the guidance and expertise that we receive from our health professionals on the front lines of the pandemic ... and as we work to safely adapt and implement our ministries in light of the current status of the virus and our available safeguards against it.

We also stand on the threshold of a major staff transition with the resignation of Pastor Sarah. Please know that your staff has already begun the examination of gaps we need to fill in various ministries, and we have begun to put plans in place to keep our ministries active in ways that are viable in our current health environment. Times of pastoral vacancy while a challenge in some ways, are also a great opportunity to look at our ministries through new sets of eyes, and seek out new gifts and talents from church members who may have yet to find their niche of sharing their time and talents. Part of this transition period will center on a call process for a new pastor. You will see the first of what will be monthly updates on our call process elsewhere in this issue of the Herald. I will offer an update each month, even if that update does not have lots of earthshattering news ... please be aware that call processes in the Lutheran Church proceed with a speed that lies somewhere between molasses and a sprinting turtle. I thank you ahead of time for your partnership in prayer for our ministries and our call process ... for your commitment to consider where there may be a service role you can fill ... for your support of your leaders and fellow parishioners who will step up to serve ... and for your patience when some ministries move a little slower than you prefer.

From the Director of Music

All Creation Sings

If you were at traditional worship services about a month ago, or if you tuned into our livestream, you may have heard Pastor Martin Zimmann reference a number of hymnals during his sermon. Of course he mentioned the "green one" (Lutheran Book of Worship), the "blue one", (With One Voice), the "cranberry one" (Evangelical Lutheran Worship), and the "purple one." I saw more than a few quizzical looks and thought it was time for an introduction to our

latest worship resource from the ELCA and Augsburg Fortress: All Creation Sings.

As we have progressed through the cycles of hymnal creation, you may have noticed a pattern. About 15 years into the life of a primary resource we get a hymnal supplement. After LBW's release in 1978, we found ourselves in need of more worship resources that reflected the church's needs and the times. Enter, With One Voice in 1995. We now find ourselves 15 years after ELW's release. Can you believe we've had that hymnal for 15 years?! Following the pattern, Augsburg Fortress and the ELCA worked to create and release All Creation Sings a new hymnal supplement, in 2020.

"Don't we have plenty of songs to sing?" "What's wrong with the old songs?" "Why do we need this?" I can hear these thoughts from here and they are important questions to ask. Hymnal supplements such as this are not meant to be a replacement resource. Instead supplements are a way for worshiping communities to encounter the word of God in new ways and retaining access to those songs which form the core of our expression of faith.

I'm hoping to spend the next couple of months helping us to explore this resource and what it may have to offer. Here are a couple of little statistics for now. The new supplement includes 200 songs to sing, new settings of the liturgy, and a host of newly written prayers that will serve as a resource for all worshipers and worship planners. The songs included in this resource are not all new. Some songs are familiar words set to a new tune. Some songs are familiar tunes with new words. Some songs are familiar words to familiar tunes. We actually now have "Deep River" and "When the Saints Go Marching In" in a worship resource!

As part of our already purchased access to worship planning resources, we are able to make use of much of this resource by reproducing songs where we so desire. The church has also acquired enough hymnals for the choirs to begin becoming familiar with the contents of the supplement. It's my hope that this new resource will serve to enlive our faith, remind us of God's ever-present spirit, and give us new songs to sing in a world that needs our light and life.


