We read Scripture, pray, hear a story intended to evoke some of our emotional load, light candles, and share anointing with oil. The service lasts about 30 minutes.

## **Call Committee Update**

So, let's talk about rostered leadership this month, in relation to our coming call process. If you attended the Town Hall meeting in October, or spoke with someone who did, you may be familiar with my words about how the synod approaches the resignation or retirement of a senior pastor. I want to clarify those comments, because I was sloppy in the language I used in my brief discussion around filling our current pastoral vacancy.

To start, "rostered leaders" are those persons who have been trained, examined and acknowledged by the ELCA, to serve congregations in the synods or institutions of the ELCA. In recent years we have had three rostered leaders on our staff at St. Peter's ... myself, Sister Dottie and Pastor Sarah. Each of us has a Master of Divinity degree and enjoy the approval of our Lower Susquehanna Synod candidacy committee to serve in the congregations of the ELCA. Sister Dottie also has a Doctor of Ministry degree from Lancaster Theological Seminary, although that degree does not actually affect her ability to serve congregations. Pastors are called to serve congregations through Word and Sacrament ministry, and are typically focused inward for the health and vitality of the congregation. Deacons are called to Word and Service ministry, and are typically focused outward toward the community in which a congregation is located, and they strive to help the congregation be a Christian presence outside the walls of the church. The policy of the Evangelical Lutheran Church is that when a senior pastor retires or leaves a call, all other rostered leaders will also offer their resignations to the congregation. I believe that the logic behind this is that a new senior pastor should have the freedom to shape the core personnel of the congregation in which s/he will serve. Please note that tendering one's resignation as a rostered leader, does not mean that the congregation is obligated to receive and activate that resignation. A new senior pastor can advise a congregation to not accept the resignation of other rostered leaders, so that they may stay on staff. In this kind of setting, my hope and expectation would be that our next senior pastor would clearly see the value of having Sister Dottie on staff and would not recommend that St. Peter's accept her resignation.

I share this conversation, because this may be the ideal time for St. Peter's to seek to call your next senior pastor. I will be sixty-five in two months and the call process for a senior pastor may take us a couple of years. A newly called pastor may see some value in having me remain on staff until a new associate pastor can be found which would no doubt take an additional couple of years for a second call process. Then at that point with a full rostered staff restored, I could retire and drift off into the sunset. Those are considerations that none of us can yet answer, including me. But I have some flexibility in terms of how long I can remain on staff during this transition. I'll need to give some thought to what these years ahead of me will look like for me, with my family's help. St. Peter's leadership should do the same. No matter how the years ahead play out, when the time comes for me to retire, I will do so with nothing but gratitude for the blessing this call has been as one of your pastors.

Also, if you submit any donations via an online Tithely transaction, be aware that there can be a 3-5-day delay from the time of the transaction to the date of the deposit (the church uses the deposit date as the contribution date). You should make any Tithely donations before Christmas if you want to ensure they get credited to 2021 giving.

## **National Safe Toys and Gifts Month**

With the holiday season in full swing, gifts, (particularly children's gifts), will be exchanged across the nation in earnest. Although I think we're pretty sure that Santa ensures all presents are rigorously safety tested, we may need to make sure we give gifts that meet safety standards.

Unfortunately, thousands of children are injured every year as a result of playing with unsafe or non-age appropriate toys. The United States Consumer Product Safety Commission has created a robust toy safety system, by requiring testing by independent, third party testing laboratories around the world; enforcing stringent lead and phthalates limits for toys; imposing some of the most stringent toy standards in the world. While this goes a long way in protecting our children, young people, and adults, there are still many toy related injuries that take place. In 2010 over 251,700 toy related accidents were reported in hospital emergency rooms in the US.

Obviously accidents will always happen, but this is the perfect opportunity to review some basic safety advice. The following are some safety tips to keep in mind

**Balloons** - Children can choke or suffocate on deflated or broken balloons. Keep deflated balloons away from children younger than eight years old. Discard broken balloons immediately.

Small balls and other toys with small parts - For children younger than age three, avoid toys with small parts, which can cause choking.

**Scooters and other riding toys -** Riding toys, skateboards and in-line skates go fast, and falls could be deadly. Helmets and safety gear should be worn properly at all times and they should be sized to fit.

**Magnets -** High-powered magnet sets are dangerous and should be kept away from children. Whether marketed for children or adults, building and play sets with small magnets should also be kept away from small children.

#### Once gifts are open:

- Immediately discard plastic wrapping & other toy packaging before they become dangerous play things.
- Keep toys appropriate for older children away from younger children
- Battery charging should be supervised by adults. Chargers and adapters can pose thermal burn hazards to young children. Pay attention to instructions and warnings on battery chargers. Some chargers lack any mechanism to prevent overcharging.

Let's make sure the holiday season is a safe and enjoyable one. Merry Christmas!

## Administratively Speaking ...

The 2022 annual budget has been approved! At the Annual Meeting on Sunday, November 14, the congregation voted to approve the St. Peter's budget for 2022. The budget will be almost \$10,000 less than the 2021 budget. The Finance Committee Chair, Sherry Moul, asked church committee chairs to be conservative in their budget requests for 2022 and include a COVID-19 pandemic impact factor reduction where possible. And they did! As such, not a single committee budget had to be reduced by the Finance Committee this year. AND, the Finance Committee reviewed and finalized the budget in just ONE meeting! I have never seen this in my 35 years of ministry! Bravo Zulu (as we said in the Navy) to the hard and dedicated work of your Finance chair, her team, AND all committee chairs for developing the 2022 budget.

In other news, we shut down the cooling tower. You know what that means...winter is coming. In staff meetings, we are already talking about our snow policy for church events. Special thanks to George Groff for coming over to power wash the cooling tower and remove the built-up "sludge" to prepare the tower for next summer's use.

#### End of year giving opportunities...

The falling of leaves from the trees means Thanksgiving and Christmas are not far off. As you make your end of year giving plans, keep in mind that there are various ways to make your gift to St. Peter's general ministry fund, as well as to the Mission Campaign appeal. Below are a few ways to consider.

- ♦ Write a check (Remember, you can deduct up to 100% of your Adjusted Gross Income in 2021, through cash gifts.)
- ♦ Give online through Tithe.ly.
- ♦ Give a gift a stocks, bonds, or mutual funds. The stock market is UP and your investments have likely increased in value. You can deduct the entire value of the investment AND avoid paying any capital gains tax on the sale! The church will sell the positions and use them for church ministry work.
- ♦ If you are over 72 years old, you are required by the IRS to withdraw a portion from your IRA or 401(k) fund and pay tax on this withdraw. The pain of this RMD (Required Minimum Distribution) can be avoided! You are allowed to send all or even just a portion of your RMD straight to St. Peter's, so that the church can use these funds for ministry and you are NOT taxed on the funds that come to the church. Perhaps even more impactful, keeping this income off of your tax return can help reduce the potential for adverse effects on your Social Security and Medicare benefits. This is called a QCD (Qualified Charitable Distribution). And St. Peter's IS a "qualified charity" for these types of gifts.

Discuss these options with your tax advisor, then give me a call to talk about your options. I will send you or your investment broker the appropriate information to make these transfers quickly and smoothly. One donor sent me an email with this comment, after his experience of donating stock for his donation:

"Paul – Great news! Thanks for sharing. Such an easy process I will definitely keep in mind for future contributions."

I pray for a very happy Thanksgiving and Christmas season for you and your family, as we remember the reason for the season. Praise God for His Son and the blessings we enjoy.



Intelligencer Journal – December 22, 1956

Roger Patches, a student of the ministry and member of the congregation of St. Peter's Lutheran Church, Neffsville, will be the narrator for a presentation of the Christmas story in music at the church tomorrow at 7:10 p.m. The service will open with an organ recital by Harold Sawyer, Jr. Included in the program will be the Nativity carol "The Holy Boy" by John Ireland, and the "Christmas Carol Preludes" by Marcel Dupre. Participating in the service will be the three choirs of the church under the direction of Mrs. Russell J. Nuss, choir director for the past 9 years. Mrs. Nuss is president of Lancaster Chapter, American Guild of Organists. Soloists in the choir presentations will be George Kratzert, Harold Sawyer, Samuel Bailey, Mrs. J. H. Krick and Mrs. Donald Peters. The church's annual Christmas Eve Candle lighting Service will be held at 7:30 p.m. Monday. The three choirs will again sing. 

## Pastor's Letter

Hi Folks:

A blessed Advent to you! Has this "season of waiting" ever felt more relevant than in these past two years? We are waiting on lots of things this year, aren't we? But they may not be the usual "waitings" that typically command our attention in December ... that favorite gift you are hoping for ... a beautiful light snowfall on Christmas morning ... your radio station starting up their 24/7 Christmas carol barrage ... or a family dinner with all the fixings. Maybe this year you are wait-

ing to get a vaccine for your elementary school child ... or a booster shot for yourself. Maybe you are waiting for the results of a Covid test for a loved one who is quite ill ... or you're waiting for a lessening of mask restrictions. Some of you may be waiting to see what your job will look like as your company transitions to a remote work environment ... and you are waiting to see whether you will have a job in the changing landscape of your company. Maybe you are just waiting for the malaise and fatigue of dealing with "all things pandemic" to stop ... or even ease a bit.

Most years, the waiting that we do in Advent might be described as "waitings of choice." We are in control of our personal world for the most part, and so the things we wait for are somewhat within our power to manage. This year that is not the case. There are many things that are not within our power to manage. These days we face "waitings of necessity." Most relate to the Covid outbreak, and the collateral damage it brings to all of our institutions, from our homes ... to our workplaces ... to our churches and community agencies ... to our governmental programs and institution, both local and national. In a country that prides itself on the concept of "freedom", it is a tough pill to swallow.

As I play out this theme of "waiting" with you, please know that I have never been a believer in the idea that God "sends us these traumas" to teach us something, or to punish us for something. The Bible reminds us constantly of the brokenness of the world. God doesn't need to punish us ... our misuse of the freedom we are granted creates an endless stream of trauma in our world, in global, local and personal realms. We call it "sin." Covid is a particularly nasty version of that brokenness. But God's involvement is never in the creation of the trauma. God's involvement is found in the faith offered to us to persevere and strive to restore order, and the reminder that life is not defined by any one moment in time.

So maybe our "Advent waiting" this year is not solely a liturgical or theological exercise, as we relive the various themes of preparation and waiting for the inbreaking of Jesus' presence in our world. Maybe this year there is a visceral and tangible component to our waiting. Maybe, the arrival of Jesus in your life will be found in the improved health of a family member ... or in a long-awaited reunion with a loved one ... or in some stability returning to your life because more and more people around you have gotten their vaccines ... or in just the simple joy of gathering with others again.

The Advent theme of "God with us" may never be more potently felt than this year, as we experience a gradual easing of so many restrictions (thanks to our vaccine availability and good common sense in our use of personal choices of hygiene and safety). I pray that you can enjoy some incarnational moments in which Jesus is with you in the gatherings you can manage with those you love. We will be doing that very thing in our Advent and Christmas worship. It will not be completely "back to normal." But it will be communal in a safe and sustainable way.

See you in church (however that looks at this moment of time) ...

## From the Director of Music

#### A time for preparation

Advent is here and I'm excited about it. I find the music and messages of this season to be meaningful, centering, and a good foil for the trappings of our commerce-centric society. In particular, this year I'm thinking a lot about preparations.

We often think of Advent as a time for preparation, and it is. While we are preparing to welcome Christ as a baby in the manger with gifts and worship, we are also taught to prepare our hearts for the Lord's arrival.. We prepare to be amazed that God would become flesh and dwell among us, going through the same ups and downs of life that we go through. We are preparing for the message that Emmanuel, God with us, is truly with us and not in a cloud far away watching creation unfold.

Advent, though, is also about the changing of the whole world. It is the way of the world that the old must give way for the new to take its place. We see our leaders turn over, we see programs and maybe ministries coming to a close and others being reborn. This continual cycle of life, death, and rebirth is central to our beliefs as Christians. Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again. Past. Present. Future.

Right now we might be feeling like the last year and a half has been one big preparation. After coming to a screeching halt, we may feel that ever since then we have been building to this moment. To be certain this preparation hasn't been easy. We've shed tears, expressed frustration, endured suffering, and even had moments of pure joy. Walking through this pandemic together has shown us that worship takes place in our hearts and that, despite our ability or inability to gather together, God continues to walk with us and with our community.

Perhaps the lesson here is that all of life is really a preparation. All of life is a rehearsal for that next life when all will be made right. We are called to walk with one another in good and bad times. While the last year and a half may have been more challenging than the year and a half before that, our call remains the same: to accompanying one another on our pilgrimage through this life, to share the love of Christ that sets us free to serve our neighbors, and to praise the creator of the universe with all that we are.

As we prepare this season, whether it be preparations for family gatherings, for church events, or for personal study, let us remember that we are truly an Advent people. We are always preparing for that moment when Christ will break into our lives and make the world whole. Though the work of preparation is never finished, we may rest securely knowing that God is with us every step of the way, no matter what season we may be in.
