Happy New Year! As of January 3, 105 households have supported the *Faith in Our Future* campaign, pledging treasures totaling \$940,080! These treasures include \$413,383 in pledge payments and outright gifts. To date, Congregation Council has received access to \$380,000 in contributed funds that are already being put to good use.

History of St. Peter's Narthex Furniture

1987 to present day

Did you know that our narthex furniture was 34 years old? It has served us well! We had a major expansion program when Pastor Geib was our Senior Pastor. The furniture was *first* purchased in May 1987 for our new CHAPEL-PARLOR. Our building contractor suggested we work with his Interior Decorator who helped us choose furniture and fabrics. In May of 2006 we had *another* major expansion, and the *former* chapel furniture was moved to our NEW narthex area. And this is where the furniture has been for the past 16 years!! The former Chapel then became our church Library! The narthex furniture was in very poor condition. Paul, our Church Administrator, recently disposed of most of this furniture prior to a large meeting of the Lower Susquehanna Synod which was being held at St. Peter's. At the December Council Meeting the Interior Decorating Committee presented a proposal to purchase new furniture. The proposal was approved using funds from the Mission Campaign, and the furniture has been ordered. Delivery will be sometime this Spring.

From the Archives

Lancaster New Era - February 3, 1934

The Rev. Clay E. Rice, pastor of St. Peter's Lutheran, Neffsville and Zion Lutheran, East Petersburg, will observe the completion of 15 years in this pastorate. Pastor Rice served only one other church, St. Paul's, Lionville, Chester County, 1914 to 1919. During his fifteen years: Members received into the church, 445; children baptized, 132; marriages performed, 76; funerals conducted, 190. During this period, the congregations have maintained a splendid record in support of general church benevolence. The Neffsville congregation has met its obligation in full every year, contributing a total of \$11,259. The East Petersburg congregation has contributed a total of \$8,807.

One of their young children left the water running in the upstairs bathroom with a washcloth over the drain. Imagine the amount of water during a two-week vacation. As the old saying goes, "An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure" and a tremendous upheaval and expense in your life if the worst happens.

Epiphany Star was hung in early January.

Those who are coming to the in-person worship have seen the Epiphany Star hanging in the back of the sanctuary. As soon as the church opened after the new year began, Rich Larrick came in (as he has been doing for over 20 years) to hang and light the Epiphany Star. As a Baptist, this tradition is new to me, so I Googled it.

"Epiphany means 'appearance or manifestation.' Throughout the world, Christians celebrate it on January 6 - 12 days after Christmas Day. Many countries refer to it as 'Three Kings Day'. On this day, Western Christianity recognizes Christ's manifestation to the Gentiles. The Gentiles, represented when The Magi visited the child Jesus and showed how God's gift of the Good News is for all people. Eastern Christianity observes Jesus' baptism on this day. His baptism revealed his identity to mankind. In the East or the West, Epiphany celebrates God revealing himself to the world." Source: Christianity.com

Pastor's Letter

I write this month with an expression of thanks for the variety of ways that you have adjusted to the unique realities of life at Sr. Peter's at the moment. We are expecting Covid case numbers to start falling again following the spike in cases created in part by Christmas and New Year's festivities, along with the spike in cases created by the omicron variant. Although we are all feeling a little ho-hum about the message, it remains true that vaccine usage, mask wearing in group settings, and careful consideration about the places you go and activities you participate in, remain the best practices for keeping the virus and its variants in check. We will continue to use

our Risk Management and Worship teams to recommend decisions about the restrictions we will observe in worship and other gatherings inside of our building.

You should be aware that the Bishop of our Lower Susquehanna Synod, the Rev. James Dunlop, visited with Council at their January meeting, for the purpose of having a conversation around the call process. It was a productive and informative meeting. From this point forward, our Congregation Council will take the lead in forming the Call Committee and assigning responsibility for the creation of our Congregational Profile. The Bishop identified a couple of different options that the call process for a new senior pastor can take, granting us a fair amount of flexibility in how the congregation would prefer the call process to proceed. If you have questions about the call process, please direct them to a Council member. The Council will also be spearheading the Call Committee reports that will show up in the bulletin and Herald. My contribution to the process will be to identify a projected date for my retirement. I will have a conversation with my family, give some thought to it myself, and then inform Council of the date. I am personally grateful for the flexibility Bishop Dunlop is allowing our congregation as we decide what is the best process to follow going forward.

Allow me to take this moment to thank many of you for your sacrificial giving this past year. In spite of our in-person worship numbers being modest, many of you have not only maintained your giving, but have increased it. Many of you have stayed in touch with life at St. Peter's through on-line worship and digital communications. We thank you for that as well. You leaders have been humbled by your faithful and consistent contributions and participation in St. Peter's ministries as are possible, and give thanks to God (and to each of you) for keeping the church and our ministries and mission in your thoughts, prayers, and financial planning.

Looking ahead, we continue to strive to grow our worship attendance in safe and protected ways. Weekly, we assess our variety of in-person gatherings to see which ones can safely continue to meet on campus and which ones may need to briefly pause their activities or move to remote gatherings. We make these choices with an eye to safe practices balanced with the value of being together in-person in safe ways. We ask you for your prayers and for your support, even when choices may not be the choices you would make as an individual or family. We are committed to making decisions that consider all of our members, that land at various places on the spectrum of public gatherings and the use of protective practices like mask wearing and social distancing.

TORNADO RELIEF

From Sister Dottie

Current CDC Guidelines for Covid Exposure/Quarantine - January 14, 2022

In order to prevent confusion as to the best policies surrounding COVID exposure, testing and mask wearing, we will be following the CDC guidelines for our staff, preschool, ministries and worship.

Please stay home if you are not feeling well. Also, we are requiring mask wearing during preschool and Sunday morning ministries. During the omicron spike, we are also requesting that even vaccinated people wear masks in their small group ministries.



If you or your child tests positive for COVID:

Day 0 is your first day of symptoms or a positive viral test. Day 1 is the first full day after your symptoms developed or your test specimen was collected.

- Persons who test positive for COVID-19 must isolate for 5 days. If after 5 days, the patient is asymptomatic or has resolving symptoms, their isolation period is over; however, they should still wear a mask around others until day 10
- Regardless of vaccination status, anyone who tests positive for COVID-19 must:

Isolate at home for 5 days.

As much as possible, stay in a specific room away from other people and pets in the home and wear a mask around other people in the home.

If you or your child is exposed to someone with COVID:

Those with an exposure to COVID-19 and are NOT up-to-date on COVID-19 vaccinations (unvaccinated) or those without the booster shot:

- Stay home and quarantine for at least 5 full days.
- Wear a well-fitted mask if you must be around others in your home.
- Get tested-Even if you don't develop symptoms, get tested at least 5 days after you last had close contact with someone with COVID-19.
- Watch for symptoms until 10 days after you last had close contact with someone with COVID-19.
- If you develop symptoms: isolate immediately and get tested. Continue to stay home until you know the results. Wear a well-fitted mask around others.

If you are fully vaccinated and are exposed to someone with Covid:

- You do not need to stay home unless you develop symptoms.
- Get tested even if you don't develop symptoms, get tested at least 5 days after you last had close contact with someone with COVID-19.
- Watch for symptoms until 10 days after you last had close contact with someone with COVID-19.
- If you develop symptoms-Isolate immediately and get tested. Continue to stay home until you know the results. Wear a well-fitted mask around others.
- Wear a mask around others for 10 days.

Preschool Parents:

Please let us know if your child tests positive or has been exposed to someone who is positive, especially if they are not vaccinated.

SS/Youth Group Parents:

Please let us know if your child has tested positive after being in Sunday school or youth group so we can let others know.

Adults:

Again, if you were in a small ministry group within 5 days of testing positive, please contact the church – we need to contact trace and make sure those who are unvaccinated are aware of the potential risk.

Thank you for your patience as we continue to navigate this pandemic. Our main goal is the health and safety of all who enter our doors. Rest assured we continue to evaluate protocol on a daily basis.

Message From Dr. David Emmert

The rostered leaders have asked me to summarize where we are currently with the Omicron variant of COVID and what that should mean to us as members of St. Peter's and members of our Lancaster County community. I'm a family physician in Millersville, and I've been attending St. Peter's and singing in the choir for twenty years, and I want to keep our community healthy.


We're seeing a huge number of COVID cases in the county right now, far beyond what we saw last year at this time, the previous peak. This does not include the increasing number of cases that are not officially reported, diagnosed by home tests. We should assume it is everywhere, because it probably is.



Omicron may or may not be "milder". Initial reports from South Africa suggested it didn't often affect the lungs, but that was a much different population of patients. My colleagues and I are not seeing a milder illness. Hospitals are close to being overwhelmed. This variant has exploded, and we are clinging to the hope that it will pass relatively quickly as well, peaking within the next few weeks.

We still need to take this seriously. If you have not been vaccinated, please get your first shot. We are lucky to have vaccines that have turned out to be not only incredibly effective, but also safe (clear at this point, after 520 million doses given).

If you are vaccinated, consider getting a booster. This tops off your antibodies, making it less likely to get infected at all with COVID for the next 3-4 months, and gives added protection against Omicron complications. Most boosted patients feel like they have a typical cold when they get infected; by contrast, a 50-yr-old unvaccinated patient of mine just died at home before his wife knew he was having symptoms.



What else can we do? For a while, we need to go back to masking every time we're around others. We need to assume others are infected, because they probably are. This includes even small groups, at least for the next month or two. St. Peter's just updated their masking and quarantine policy (https://www.stpeterslutheran.org/safety-protocol-while-in-the-church-building/), which is great!

Let's up our mask game. Give up the cloth masks—surgical and N95 masks are easily available now, and much better at protecting you. (A word, though: none of them work if they aren't fitted well. They should be tight but comfortable.)

Get home antigen tests, and if you have any question about whether you are contagious, use one before coming to church. These tests have a reputation for not being accurate, but they are misunderstood. They are excellent at doing one thing, and they do it better than PCR tests: they tell you if you are contagious at that moment. So if you wake up with sinus symptoms, test yourself before you take the chance of infecting others.

I truly believe that, unless there is a new and different variant around the corner ("pi", I guess?), 2022 will be a transitional year for us with this pandemic. We're so tired of this, but I can see major progress coming. Game-changing pills called Paxlovid work like Tamiflu if you catch COVID early, and should be available towards summer. Vaccines will be offered to younger children by summer. Once these things happen, COVID won't be anything we need to fear. I can see St. Peter's getting back to the kinds of fellowship we have missed so much over the last 2 years, and it really won't be too long now, though, we're still in the thick of it. Please get your vaccines, mask up, avoid high-risk groups, and test before coming to church if needed. We've come so far from the days of wiping down our groceries. Omicron is a bump in the road, but it's one that we need to take seriously to protect our families and our community.

This is the month we hear about Punxsutawney Phil. We'll soon know if there will be six more weeks of winter. For me, I'm ready for the cold to be over.

Once again, we are back to where we were a year ago. Cases are increasing and we are all being more cautious. How long is it going to last this time? There really isn't an answer. But that doesn't mean we can't move forward in other ways. It's important for us to keep supporting St. Peter's with our time, talent and treasure, as many of us continue to do. 
