Ukrainian Easter Eggs

Pysanky are Ukrainian Easter eggs decorated with traditional Ukrainian folk designs using a wax-resist method. Many eastern European ethnic groups decorate eggs at Easter using the wax-resist method. In modern times, the art of the *pysanka* (decorated egg) was carried abroad by Ukrainian emigrants to North America, where the custom took hold, and was actually banned in Ukraine by the Soviet regime (as a religious practice), where it was nearly forgotten. In a large family, by Holy Thursday, 60 or more eggs would have been completed by the women of the house. The eggs would be taken to the church on Easter Sunday to be blessed, after which many were given away. The writing tool, called a kistka, is



dipped in melted beeswax and applied to the egg. The egg is then dipped in dye. This process is repeated many times adding more designs and dipping the egg in a different color of dye each time. The wax is then removed by holding the egg over a candle flame revealing the intricate designs. The finished egg is varnished and the inside of the egg is removed by piercing small holes in the top and bottom. If handled carefully, the eggs can last indefinitely! St. Peter's was first introduced to this art form by Pastor Craig and Nancy Ross in the 1990's. Nancy continued to teach classes each Lent for several years. Then, Beryl Swisher, a church member, continued to lead weekly classes at St. Peter's for a number of years. Some of the eggs, currently displayed in our Narthex curio cabinet, were created by some of our St. Peter's members.

From the Archives

Rev. Isaac Walton Bobst called as pastor

St. Peter's Lutheran Church – June 1, 1890

Isaac W. Bobst was raised by a poor family in Berks County. He went to work at an early age to help his family. He was a cigar maker. His father died in 1861 following a long illness. Isaac was just 14 years old helping to support his family. In August 1862 he eventually enlisted in the Union Army at age 16. The monthly pay would enable him to support his family. He was captured twice and held as a prisoner in Chancellorsville and Andersonville. He was released in a prisoner exchange just before the end of the war. Following the war, young Isaac worked his way through college and by 1879, he emerged from Gettysburg Seminary as a Lutheran minister at age 32. On June 1st, 1890 the Rev. Isaac Walton Bobst was called as St. Peter's pastor with a yearly salary of \$500.

April – Move More Month

Every April is National Move More Month. The objective is clear & simple: Get up & Move!



Created by the American Heart Association as a way to help improve the health of Americans, the aim is to encourage everyone to hit 10,000 steps a day or 30 minutes of exercise a day. The benefits of living an active lifestyle have been known for years. This month isn't about perfecting any form of exercise, but embracing any movement and an active lifestyle. These are key components to being a healthier person. Regardless of the type of exercise

you choose, getting out & moving during the month of April (and beyond), is so important. So....

Go for a walk. You've been doing it for most of your life. It's one of the healthiest things you can do.

Go for a run. More advanced than walking, and just as healthy. Get some miles and chase that runner's high.

Lift some weights. If cardio isn't your thing, work those gains through lifting weights. You don't need a gym or professional weights – check out the pantry. There are some canned goods that will work just as well.

FACTS: \$1 trillion = the cost of heart disease. The economic costs (both direct and indirect) of cardiovascular and heart disease are projected to reach \$1 trillion by 2035 unless we take the time to move more & get more exercise. 69% of people are overweight. About sixty-nine percent of U.S. adults are obese, & that statistic will only rise unless we do our part to create healthy habits and exercise more. 80% is preventable. Eighty percent of cardiovascular disease is considered preventable, especially by getting out and moving more.

Why We Love Move More Month

It keeps us healthy. Moving more and maintaining an active lifestyle is key to increasing your overall health.



It gets us out and about. Life is more than the tv or phone. Get out, move, and get some sunshine! We love April, because the weather turns warmer, we can witness the start of God's growing season, & we can be outside more (and there is more sunshine – but walking in a rain shower is fun too). It leads to better daily habits. The more you do something, the more of a habit it can become.

Getting daily exercise is one of the best habits you can embrace.

Property Committee Update



Hi there. I am Mark Aho, the new Property Committee chair. I would like to first acknowledge the massive contribution of Bud Benton, the previous chair, who in a short time initiated a large number of Property improvements many of which are still in progress. The committee intends to best honor his memory by seeing his vision through to completion. While there are a myriad of projects, I want to inform you about the most significant near term ones.

Paving the parking lot – this is scheduled with Kreider Paving for the first 2 weeks of June after Preschool is done and with the lower activity level of many groups during the summer. The logistics of pulling this off while maintaining access for Sunday worship and other critical needs is daunting but manageable. As we get closer much more detailed information will be shared for planning purposes.

As part of this project the fence enclosure for the trash dumpsters will be moved to the rear of the property out near the sheds on the west side. The current enclosure fence is damaged, the size is not large enough to contain the added dumpsters for recycling and the present location violates Manheim Twp zoning regulations.

The parking lot lighting will also be upgraded to LED bulbs which will both improve the light coverage as well as reduce electricity consumption. Bob Preston is leading this part of the effort as well as LED upgrades throughout the facility.

Eastside landscaping – Broderick's Landscaping, led by our own Chris Shimer, will be installing new plantings along the Lititz Pike side of the building. This is over 400 ft. of beds and will go a long way toward improving this highly visible impression of St Peters from the road. Depending on weather this may be complete by Easter.

There are numerous smaller projects always underway from HVAC upgrades to general maintenance to advance planning for equipment replacements. I look forward to tackling these and making sure we are all good stewards of our collective investment.



Property replanting project update...

By now you have noticed that ALL the plants on the Lititz Pike side of the church are GONE. They had either died or been too overgrown to trim back, So..... Property Committee decided to remove them and replant new ones. You can have a part in this project!

A few weeks back, a church member saw that the plants were removed and asked if she could buy a plant in memory of her beloved dog, Jazzy. I thought that was touching, as I too lost a beloved cat last year. I floated an idea through leadership and the Mission Campaign co-chairs, Adrian and Jen, and everyone liked the idea. Well, Paul, how does it work?

You cannot purchase your own plant, but you can select a plant and make a suggested donation of \$50 or \$100 (depending on the size and type of plant) <u>or more</u>, to the <u>Mission Campaign</u> (which is funding part of the cost of this major landscape project) in honor of someone or in memory of a loved one or pet. Members of your Property Committee will man a table in the narthex after the second service on <u>Sunday, March 27 and April 3</u> or stop by the office any time. We will have a color landscape plot of the front of the church with each plant numbered and a color photo of what the plant will be (helpful for those like me who like colorful plants but can't name a single one, and still believe Dandelions are pretty flowers in the lawn-LOL). Below is a photo of the landscape plot and one of the color photos I mentioned above.

Unfortunately, we cannot install a memorial sign next to the plant you select, but YOU will know the location of the plant that is planted in memory of your loved one or pet. Instead, we will publish a list in a Sunday bulletin and in the Herald with the names of the donors and the name of the person or pet they want to remember.

What a wonderful way to remember your loved one or pet <u>AND</u> contribute to our Mission Campaign appeal!

Musical Arts June 5th Program Change

Pastor's Letter

He who was seated on the throne said, "I am making everything new!" (Rev. 21:5)

Dear Friends:

So ... what is the new normal? I have asked myself that question a lot, these past two years. Sometimes I ask myself this question, as I try to wrap my head around the experiences and responsibilities that seem to regularly change in my life. I also find myself thinking more about the congregational

changes we have tackled, and what will be different for St. Peter's in the years ahead of us, because of COVID. And at times, I try to consider how different the world is than it was two years ago, and the implications that COVID has for nations and cultures and those who cherish their heritage. The world has changed somewhat dramatically since that day in March of 2020, when most of us found ourselves scrambling to re-adjust our lives in light on this aggressive virus that was spreading around the globe like wildfire. For us at St. Peter's it was the week of March 15th in 2020 when the ... hit the fan. (Incense ... I was thinking about incense hitting the fan.)

I prefer to live as a creature of habit ... I love having routines in my life ... and it is routines and rituals that have always drawn me to parish ministry. So the world of COVID is not something I have embraced very easily, nor very gracefully. And while I try to moderate myself in public when others are listening to me, I can be quite the little whiner. So, as I began my monthly wrestling match with a topic for this April Herald letter, I opened my Bible to the Book of Revelation, looking for a plague story or a pronouncement of judgment through which I could vent my spleen. And as you have already seen above, I found myself confronted by this wonderful verse from the closing drama of Revelation and its adoration of the Holy City, New Jerusalem. And I found myself convicted. I grudgingly admitted that my desire for routine, just might be getting in the way of this magnificent promise of God to bring newness to the world, and newness to our lives on both a grand scale and also in a personal way for each of us.

I'm not a prophet, so I wouldn't begin to try to discern God's will for the world in which we live. But in thinking about St. Peter's I find myself wondering about the word "community", and I think about how that word may be newly defined in a congregational setting like ours. I think about our homebound members, and I wonder about the possibility of remote worship and learning opportunities that are possible now, which weren't even on our radar screen two years ago – and the potential for connecting more effectively with this somewhat isolated community among us. I think about the privilege of being together in person with other believers, and how easily we can slip into a routine in which we take those gatherings for granted -- and now find ourselves recognizing how precious and potent those in-person contacts can be. These modest reflections are just the tip of the iceberg of opportunity, I suspect.

So, I invite you to start thinking about what this new world of ours will offer us in terms of ministry opportunities. Some of these ideas might be ideas worthy of consideration as we get closer to bringing our mission outreach fund to fruition through your ongoing support of our Mission Campaign. Some of the ideas will be fueled by time ... time that we will offer as people of faith to fuel the hands-on work of our mission plans. And some of these ministry opportunities will be teased out of vague but passionate ideas that you have, which have yet to crystalize into concrete form ... but which will take shape with continued attention and discussion. It is an exciting time to be the people of God in this place ... and COVID cannot change that ... it may simply be requiring us to move around the pieces on the mission chess board a little differently than we thought two years ago. I'll be praying for fruitful reflection on your part ... and for me as well.
